





DAMAGE TO CEMETERY WALL

You may have noticed that the cemetery wall was damaged recently. The car that caused it was still at the scene due to the damage caused to his car and I suspect it will cost more to repair the car than the cemetery wall - it was an '18 reg Nissan! As it was reported within minutes of the occurrence, I was able to go down there, take some photographs and get the driver details. These were forwarded to the Parish Council's insurers and the cemetery wall was very quickly repaired by local stonemason Nigel Chivers. The driver reported that he had swerved to avoid a dog; however, the driver of the vehicle behind later informed me that she did not see a dog!

I informed our lovely, Special Constable Richard Warren and he immediately put on his hi-vis jacket and went down there to make the area safe – thank you Richard! Many thanks also to the parishioner who reported the problem to me.

HORSE DROPPINGS!



It has been brought to the attention of the Parish Council that horses are being ridden on the pavement along The Street and leaving their droppings. This can cause problems, not only to pedestrians but also to wheelchair and buggy users as well as mums with pushchairs and toddlers and those with walking aids.

The responsibility for clearing dog mess and horse droppings lies with Wiltshire Council and any offensive "piles" can be reported through the Report an Issue page on the WC Website - mywiltshire -online-reporting

The Highway Code states: 54) You **MUST NOT** take a horse onto a footpath or pavement, and you should not take a horse onto a cycle track. Use a bridleway where possible. Equestrian crossings may be provided and you should use these where available. You should dismount at level crossings where a 'horse rider dismount' sign is displayed. Laws HA 1835 sect 72, R(S)A 1984, sect 129(5)

VEHICLE THEFT ATTEMPT!

The following information was received from a resident in Newtown. This incident occurred Wednesday, 27th February. "Around 10.15pm yesterday we heard a loud noise outside our property in Newtown. My husband found our key safe had been smashed open and the key stolen. 3 people were seen running in the direction of Mere Avenue."

The police advised that they are seeing a large number of incidents like this locally. "Offenders are particularly seeking out homes with high performance cars; they are using various bits of technology and scanners to override a car's keyless entry system. Please be vigilant of anyone acting suspiciously in the village and report any concerns to the police. Ensure your property is secured even if you are at home. The police advised not leaving any keys either in or near the door. The Police Log Number for this incident is **372**, if you are a victim or aware of a similar incident, please quote this reference so that it can be cross referred to the original".

ILLEGAL HARE COURSING!

"We had a report of hare coursing near Clapcote yesterday evening. Officers attended and located the car. Lamps were seen in the distance but we could not locate the persons or dogs. However, the vehicle was seized as it was SORN. Last registered keeper was from Wales so we suspect that was where they had come from." Clapcote is the area just beyond the sharp right hand bend on the road to Grittleton so, please be alert and be aware.

If you wish to report an incident of hare coursing in progress please call the Police on 999 quoting 'Operation Artemis'. If you have information regarding a hare coursing event, please contact the police on 101 again quoting 'Operation Artemis', or you can report it to Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.



On a local level, please be suspicious of people seen out with lurchers that don't look like they are out for a country walk, particularly with lamps at night.

HULLAVINGTON NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN

The Hullavington NDP started in November 2015 and is fast approaching the end of a very long, difficult, and at times frustrating journey! The Plan is approaching the end of the Regulation 16 stage. This started on 25th February and concludes at 5pm on 8th April. This is the last chance for **YOU** to give your opinion on the plan and / or how the HNDP Steering Group responded to your queries in the Regulation 14 Consultation.

The documents are available for viewing in 3 places:

- <u>hullavington-ndp.co.uk/regulation-16-submission-documents/</u>. (view only)
- Hard copies are at Village Shop, The Hullavington Arms and Monkton Park Council Buildings in Chippenham. Hard copy reply forms are available at these locations for you to provide comments or opinion about the plan.

Documents will be displayed until 8th April 2019, however, please note that <u>consult.wiltshire.gov.uk/portal</u> is the only place comments can be left online. The Consultation closes at 5pm on the 8th April; any comments must be received by Wiltshire Council prior to this deadline.

When the Regulation 16 consultation is completed, the HNDP will then go forward for examination to ensure it meets all the required legal criteria and then finally, it will come back to the community for a simple Yes/No Referendum vote, hopefully in the late spring /early summer. Thank you for your continuing support, the input from the community has been invaluable in getting us to this stage.

Of wet and wildness? Let them be left,

January - 'The Signature of All Things' by Elizabeth Gilbert.

Mixed reactions to this book, but this was excellent for discussion. We were able to catch the BBC 2 programme about Wallace, passionately presented by comedian Bill Bailey. Portrait painting was also discussed. It is surprising where a book can lead us!

- "Too much gratuitous sex, two-dimensional secondary female characters and too much detail on mosses!"
- I found the main characters intriguing in their ability to fully dedicate themselves to their studies nature and their origins.
 It led me to look further into the work of Wallace and in turn Darwin"

Some questioned some of the personal twists and turns in the book, but any novel that can lead to greater awareness of past influences on modern knowledge in such a fluent style must be a worthwhile read.

February - 'In the Midst of Winter' by Isobel Allende

Amidst the biggest Brooklyn snowstorm in living memory, an unexpected friendship blossoms between three people thrown together by circumstance. The story sweeps from present-day Brooklyn to Guatemala to turbulent 1970's Chile and Brazil.

March - 'The Secret Life of Bees' by Sue Monk Kidd

This best-selling first novel by Sue Monk Kidd is set in South Carolina in 1964. Young Lily Owens runs away from home with her maid, Rosaleen, and they are taken in by a trio of eccentric beekeeping sisters.





"Meet the Villager"

A light hearted chat with a 'local' about their time in Hullavington

In this edition we meet Sophie Grogan



We've had links with the area for a while – I grew up in Gloucestershire, went to school in Cirencester and my husband grew up near Chepstow. We were living in London and were looking for somewhere quiet to relocate to that wasn't too isolated to bring up our children. We've been here for 18 months now and Hullavington has proved to be a great location for us; it's near the motorway for my husband who still works in London a few days a week and close to my mother who is near Marlborough.

The Village is perfect for a family with young children. At first it seemed really quiet, but we've now established there are lots of families here and activities going on. We attend Jolly Tots regularly and have been to Little Lights and Messy Church.

Sometimes when you move, if you're not part of the local school, it can be difficult to meet people. I'm a Pilates instructor running classes in the Village Hall and from home, virtually all the people I teach are 'Villagers' so it's made me feel very integrated and it's a great way to keep up to date with what's going on.
