

#### THE MYSTERY OF THE CHURCH CLOCK



Several years ago, our church clock was automated by Cumbria Clock Company removing the need to have someone climb up the tower to wind the mechanism every week. On a recent visit the engineer decided to remove the regulator to take it back to the workshop

This is why the clock is losing time and chiming at the wrong time. To adjust the time, it is necessary to stop the clock for almost 12 hours before restarting the mechanism, then repeat every few days as it goes slow! The clock will continue to run slow, with occasional adjustment until the regulator is back in place. The clock will not chime until the regulator is back in place. We apologise for the lack of accuracy of the last few weeks, normal service will be resumed as soon as possible.

#### THE VILLAGE HALL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

## The Village Hall is reopening on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> September!



Whilst it has been a sad time for those groups in the village that use the hall on a regular basis, there is an upside to the enforced closure which has been the opportunity to upgrade the hall.

The car park was showing signs of wear in parts and has been repaired; there is a lovely new floor inside the hall with new acoustic curtains. Hot water on demand is now available in all three toilets and the kitchen sinks. The Residual Current Device protection system has been upgraded as have the control systems on the six wall mounted heaters in the two halls so that they can be operated and controlled remotely via Wi-Fi!

After 6 months of enforced closure, the hall is now ready to welcome back the Core User groups from 14th September but, as you will see below, Government imposed rules and regulations must be adhered to. All necessary sanitising stations, paper towel dispensers, notices and information sheets, marker tapes or bollards are in place. The Hall is now a COVID-19 Secure venue. This means that based on the latest Government advice, core users can resume their meetings.

A big thank you to those on the Hall Committee who have worked so hard to bring our Village Hall up to date and sort through all the reams of advice, rules and regulations to enable it to reopen.

To begin with, the hall will only be available to regular core user groups. All hall users must comply with the Government's rules. These include using hand sanitising stations, implementing a thorough cleaning regime of everything that has been touched or used during the period that a hall hirer was in the hall, social distancing (2-metres) must be maintained wherever possible and face masks or coverings must be worn by anyone over the age of 11 years when they are in the hall (unless there are good reasons for them not to do so).

For the time being the kitchen will not be in use, users are asked to bring their own refreshments. Hard plastic chairs will be used as these are much easier to clean after use, users are asked to bring their own cushions if required! All these requirements are tedious and frustrating and take away the joyful and spontaneous use of the village hall but at least we are now open again – many halls in Wiltshire are still closed and seem to have little prospect of opening again in the foreseeable future.

When the hall was closed in March 2020 it was because the hall committee felt that it could not 'guarantee' that it was a safe place for people to be in, particularly those who are vulnerable. The committee still cannot guarantee that the hall is risk and virus free, but it does believe that if all the rules are adhered to, it is a venue that is worth taking a risk to use again. Currently we can not accommodate large parties such as Weddings.

**Major Hall enhancements** - Our thanks go to Julian and Liz Greenman, Peter Parry-Williams, Paul Hadley and Issie Greenman of the Hall Committee and also, Maggie Bawden and Sharon Neal for all helping to make the outcome of these projects so successful. We must not forget Bob Fenner who, as always, supervised all the projects.

We also thank Bob for the many hours he has spent, often burning the midnight oil, interpreting the 30+ page document issued giving advice with regard Covid-19 and the opening of village halls. Every time he began to feel that he had understanding, another issue of the document would arrive - at least five issues so far!

It would also seem appropriate at this point to congratulate Bob and Sue Fenner on celebrating their Golden Wedding Anniversary this year.

**Village Hall Maintenance Person** -As mentioned in the last edition, we need a new maintenance person and it is vital that the position is filled. It is a paid position per hour. If you have time on your hands and you are of a practical nature this could be just the challenge for you. If you feel you might be interested please contact a member of the Village Hall Committee.








#### How to look after the bees and insects in your garden

We all know that bee numbers have been declining drastically and while debate rages about the true cause of this decline there are practical things that we as gardeners can do to help reverse this trend. Planting some bee friendly flowers is a start but do make sure that you have something for them for the whole season. Bees have other needs too, for instance a variety of plant structures to give shelter and allow them to find a mate.

They need somewhere to live too! This might be holes in a wall, or some bare earth that allows them to create a burrow though of course it varies from species to species.

**Providing Food**—If you are growing ornamentals then pick those that you know are attractive to bees. However many vegetables and green manure crops that we use as part of our productive area can also help the bees. For instance allow green manure to flower; Phacelia, Buckwheat and Mustard can all be used. Do be careful to cut them down before they seed.

We can also optimise how we use food crops – for instance if you leave brassicas harvested in autumn / winter to flower in the early spring they provide food for bees. In addition this also gives a home to the parasitic wasps that eat cabbage white butterflies. Not to mention that is saves having to find another crop to cover the soil over the winter. If you have also under sown with a legume then this too will provide food and cover for bees.

Permanent areas in your veg garden—Many growers and farmers are looking at agroforestry as a way of improving the ecology and resilience of their system. Agroforestry as the name suggests is the combining of productive trees and annual crops. On a farm scale this often involves rows of carefully managed coppice or trained fruit or nut trees. Commercial agroforestry systems are carefully designed to make sure that the trees and other crops compliment but don't compete with each other. Generally speaking the spacing between rows of trees/ bushes should be at least 3 times the height of them to ensure enough light and sun reaches the ground crop. This may vary though depending on the crop.

Many gardens are living examples of agroforestry, though this is often by chance rather than design. Having a permanent area within your garden allows bees undisturbed ground for nesting and shelter, while a nice range of fruit trees can give lots of food during blossom.

Undisturbed soil is also great for soil organisms more generally and can provide a refuge which allows quicker recolonisation after you have dug over your annual rotations.

How seed saving can help the bees—As is often the case when you look at holistic systems, helping one part of your garden can bring benefits to the rest. One of the fringe benefits of saving your own seed is that you have to let plants go to flower which provides more food for bees and other insects. Umbelliferas (the family to which carrots, parsnips and others belong) are particularly attractive to a range of insects. Keep and replant some of your favourite biennals to flower and seed in their second year to give a greater range of bee food.





# A light hearted chat with a 'local' about their time in Hullavington

In this edition we meet Geoff Miller



My first contact with Hullavington was in the early 1970s during my RAF aircrew training phase. I spent some of the period living in the Mess at RAF Hullavington as nearby Lyneham was full at the time. The M4 was being constructed and I can remember the local people working in the Mess telling me what a waste of money it all was when we already had a perfectly good main road running through the county. I was posted to the Hercules fleet initially at Fairford where there were two squadrons and this at a time when that airfield was being used for Concorde trials

After the closure of Fairford I was moved back to Lyneham but living in the Mess at Hullavington. In the meantime I had met and married Margaret, a Yorkshire lass who was initially suspicious of living in another County. I tried to soften the blow by saying we would probably move to Yorkshire when I retired. We really ended up in Hullavington by default. We had been looking at various properties in the area, the criteria being my job at Lyneham and close enough to Bath to take advantage of its rich cultural life before possibly retiring there. It was a time of little choice and although we had been looking elsewhere, the estate agent said we might as well look at a property in Hullavington that had just come on the market.

As it was only going to be temporary we had a look and decided to buy it. We loved the location and amenities. I mean a garage, a post office, two shops and a bus service and two pubs. We've now lost some of those amenities, but here we still, are 23 years on in our 'temporary' house with no thoughts whatsoever to move to Bath ( or Yorkshire).

The village has all we want and city life doesn't look so attractive now. We like Hullavington life and we have got to know many really lovely people through the church and village activities. This is a wonderful area of the country. North Wiltshire is particularly attractive with stunning villages and a beautiful landscape that's ideal for walking and cycling. With nearby access to the 'unnecessary' motorway, close proximity to rail and air links and the beautiful city of Bath we feel particularly privileged and lucky to be living here. We can't imagine moving and I'm sorry to disappoint those who would wish otherwise.
