





Councillors Questions

with Nick Botterill

s the local Wiltshire Councillor for the area, I get asked all the time 'what do you and the council do' and 'how is this different from the parish councils'?

Wiltshire Council (excludes Swindon) has just over half a million residents spread over 1,257 sq miles. It is divided into 98 divisions, each of which has around 5,000

residents and is represented by a councillor elected every 4 years. Hullavington is one of 7 parish areas within the By Brook division.

Wiltshire Council's major services include providing Social Care services to adults and children, everything to do with Highways, Planning and Licensing, Refuse and Recycling, some Public Health and Housing services, Environment, Leisure Centres and Libraries. Spending directly or indirectly is around £1 billion pa which comes from Council Tax, Business Rates, fees and charges, council rents, borrowings and grants from central government. Like all major councils in the country the majority of the net budget (over 60% in Wiltshire) is spent on providing Social Care services to adults and children.

Local councils comprise both democracy at work and professional managerialism. Around 4,000 salaried staff manage and deliver day to day operations but the 98 elected councillors have oversight of all of this and scrutinize all the outcomes. The election every 4 years generates a political balance and the councillors of the majority party (or parties) form the council Administration which (subject to national laws) sets the policies, strategies and plans for the Council. From out of the Administration comes the Council Cabinet of 9 councillors (including the Council Leader) which provides more hands-on leadership with direct areas of responsibility. Councillors are thus not only representatives, champions and servants for their residents, but also under our system the trustees of public money with a duty to ensure equity and efficiency as best they can in all the council does. We can all take issue with things we would like to see Wiltshire Council do better (I can think of plenty!) but for all the flaws at the end of the day I would argue that basically the system of local government works. To suggest that any part of the 'system' works these days is perhaps a bit of a controversial view but it is one which stands up to analysis. Also the role of a local councillor is worthwhile (and dare I suggest important) and one I take very seriously.

HULLAVINGTON COMMUNITY GROUP UPDATES

Can I get my upgrade to <u>full fibre</u> paid for by the government?

There are 448 households Hullavington Exchange which are eligible for government vouchers and therefore able to apply for a fully funded upgrade to the new fibre optic circuit. 284 have already registered to be included. If you live in Hullavington or Norton and haven't yet done so you may be eligible.

The telephone system is being replaced throughout the UK. It is changing, exchange by exchange, from a system based on Copper Wires to Fibre Optic Cable.

This is important because currently all telephone and internet services run through these copper wires. So, the moment we plug our router or telephone into the wall-socket, it connects to the copper network; emergency pendants, alarm systems, telephone calls, Alexa, Siri etc whether hardwired or Wi Fi all are delivered via copper wires.

This change is happening for everyone; from those with no internet access through to households which rely on the internet for their livelihood. Hullavington Exchange, along with the rest of the UK is moving to full fibre which delivers a gigabit capable connection all the way into your home or business.

Openreach have targeted 2026 to complete the decommissioning of the copper wires, and whether you use the internet a lot or not at all you will need to connect to the fibre optic cable. It is a case of when, not if, you transition to the new infrastructure.

And whilst the reasons behind this national change are not essentially internet / broadband speed driven. it is a bonus that the change we will bring a faster, more reliable broadband service.

What's the benefit of upgrading now - To receive your fully funded connection to a new fibre circuit you will need to upgrade your broadband contract to one that will run on full fibre. However, you pay nothing for your home to be connected to the 1GB fibre optic cable. Additionally, if there are any extra costs discovered during the build phase or installation, regardless of whether they are big or small—you pay nothing. The upgrade is fully funded by the government.

What if I upgrade later. Even if all your neighbours are upgrading you could still choose not to do so. But bear in mind that you are going to have to upgrade probably not longer than 18 months to 2 years after everyone else has already done so, this is so, this is because your existing copper connection will no longer exist affecting all landline or other (non-mobile) phone calls, internet, Wi Fi, Alexa's, Siri's, smart technology, Sky Glass, Alarms, Medical Alerts etc. Unfortunately, your upgrade will not be funded or subsidised by the government, the funding we are using is limited, finite and can only be accessed via this project.

If you choose to wait, Openreach will charge the full cost of providing your upgrade connection, including the cost of any necessary civil engineering work that may be required. This will be fully charged to your service provider who will then decide how much of that cost to pass on to you. It could be small or equally very large, there is no way of estimating what your liability will be.

HULLAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Chair of the Parish Council Update

Good news on your Community Fibre Partnership (CFP) to bring Fibre Broadband to your home. The majority of the Parish Council members have joined the cause, it is a one-off opportunity to take advantage of a Voucher Scheme that ensures there is no cost for installing fibre cable from the road to your home by Openreach. It is the aim of the Fibre Broadband Group that the community should not miss out on receiving this funded upgrade.

There will be local road disruptions in April. Wessex Water is conducting minor but essential improvement works. Signage will be in place as it will affect some households in the areas, works commence:

Newtown 10th April 2023 (3 days) access either side of the works only.

Frog Lane 17th April 2023 (3 days) road closed 90meters south towards the Wellington Place Footpath.

Hill Hayes Lane 20th April (2 days) road closed between the Street and Belfry Drive.

Outline Planning Application at the Street. The Developer Outline Planning Application has been approved by Wiltshire Council. The next stage in the process is the Reserved Matters Application, where the detail designs are brought forward. Due to unexpected delays with round 1, it is unlikely that the development will commence for several years, it is still early days.

The replacement Speed Indicator Device will be located at the Parklands end of the village, I'm sure many of you will have seen the new 5m tall Pole awaiting the device which will be solar powered this time, no more moving up and down the village reliant on the goodwill of the older generations in the village, I thank them all for what they have done for us all over the past few years.

The Ambulance Service has been able to use the Hullavington Garage Defibrillator again this month, it has been inspected and is back in service.

Whilst the Hullavington Oil Purchase Scheme has been in place for a while now, new members can still join the scheme, it is free. You receive a confirmed price from Ford Fuels every Monday, you are not obliged to purchase through the scheme, you can shop around 500Litres minimum order, 5 day delivery turnaround. January: 'V for Victory' by Lissa Evans

This book was enjoyed by most members of our group. An easy light read.

Review:

"The third novel in Lissa Evans' successful trilogy set partly during and partly before World War2. The story follows the developing relationship between two characters introduced in the first novel, Vee, a woman existing on the edge between right and wrong and Noel, a gifted reclusive boy, she originally takes in as an evacuee. Their interaction turns around both their lives. These two are supported by other strongly drawn characters in a well written story that also combines gentle comedy and the tragedy of war.

The other two books in the series, Crooked Heart and Old Baggage, are also well worth reading, perhaps before this one."

February: 'Station Eleven' by Emily St John Mandel

We will be discussing this book at our next meeting on Tuesday 14th March. I am sure it will generate a lively session. Look out for a write up in the June/July newsletter.

"An apocalyptic novel that covers the affairs of characters pre and post the arrival of Georgia Flu, a virus that quickly sweeps the globe destroying 99% of mankind in its wake.

The transition between pre-epidemic and twenty years on is smoothly handled and the characterisations are rich. Despite the underlying huge sense of loss of life as it was, you are left with a quiet sense of hope with communities re-emerging and relationships and love developing. This is far from an easy read especially as it was written pre-COVID, and does beg the question "what if"? While certainly unsettling it is a novel well worth giving a go."

"I did not like or particularly enjoy Station Eleven but I did manage to read it to the end.

"It was a very strange story, not only the subject matter but the telling of the tale - it jumped around different times and people so much that it was hard to follow. I didn't warm to any of the characters at all. None of them seemed likeable people.

I think it would be even harder to follow this story if you are a person not familiar with Shakespeare's play King Lear - fortunately it is a play I know well and also as I have visited Toronto I was familiar with the city layout and weather descriptions. The comic book was a bit beyond my comprehension and I know nothing about Star Trek so I didn't understand those references. The story about a post pandemic world with few people left was rather far fetched I think! The whole book was rather weird and random in my humble opinion. I gave myself a gold star for getting to the end! The book group discussion will be interesting but maybe not so interesting as it would have been if discussed before the pandemic we have all recently experienced? Or maybe it will make it more interesting!??"

The Traveling Symphony are endearing and believable. The tone of the novel is quiet and dark with multi faceted stories gently intertwining in the post pandemic world. THIS EDITION: Hullavington & The Doomsday Book

ullavington, known as "Hundlavinton" was one of 13 settlements of the Hundred of Startley listed in the Doomsday Survey of 1086. With 35 households it was in the larger 20% of those listed in the Doomsday Book.

By 1086, Hullavington was valued at £12.00 per annum. The adjoining hamlets of Surrendell and Bradfield were valued at £7.00 and £1/10s respectively. All three settlements were owned by Ralph Mortimer.

Earlier occupation of Bradfield is indicated by the discovery of 8 Romano British coins and Jewellery found in the area of Bradfield Manor. Today Bradfield is the home of the Flying Monk Brewery and Tap Cafe which is situated in the beautifully refurbished barn there.

Surrendell contains a "Pillow Mound" which is a scheduled monument and a field survey of 1665 shows a conyger or rabbit warren for the breeding of rabbits and hares for their fresh meat and skins. More recently in the 1970's Surrendell Farm became known as a Hippie Commune frequented by Princess Margaret and Roddy Llewellyn amongst others. Villagers may also remember the news hounds staying at the Queen's Head or the Star and queuing up at the phone box in The Street to file their stories.

The Hundred of Startley remained intact until 1377 when, together with The Hundred of Chedglow, it was merged with Malmesbury to form the Hundred of Malmesbury.

The village centre footpath network


Walk Eight – Bradfield Wood and Malmesbury Common

Distance: 4 Miles

This month's selection from the "Walks Around Hullavington" takes you over the fields to Bradfield Wood and back.

Bradfield Wood lies about 2 miles north of the village and is well worth a visit in early spring. On a chilly, windy April day, drifts of bluebells scent the air and wood anemones and primroses provide varied colours.

From The Street, go down Parsons
Walk near "The Hullavington Arms",
turn right and follow the field paths
behind Court Farm Lake, Latimer
Gardens, Newtown and the school
playing field before meeting the
Norton road, going under the railway and passing the little Brookside
estate.



Turn right almost immediately after crossing the Gauze Brook (you see the footpath sign) and take the stile to the rear of the Bradfield cottages (now a large bungalow) car park and then the stile in the barbed wire fence.

For the first 1/4 mile or so, the trail runs parallel to the brook at the distance of about 100 yards. You can't miss, especially in Spring, the noisy rookery which occupies the line of trees on your right. Where this large field Cowleaze ends, you take the stile and bridge, bend left across Wheel Mead and soon cross a drainage ditch.

Here you go diagonally right to the far corner of another big field Lower East Field, about 600 yards ahead. The path is not evident when crops are growing but there is a stile at the corner which will only become visible a few paces before you get there. Turn right to the gateway at the end of this field East Slade, then left and a small footbridge takes you over the ditch and a gate leads into the further field.

The next part of the walk is very pleasant as you follow the hedge slightly uphill and proceed in the field along the edge of the Wood, which provides welcome shelter from prevailing westerly winds. Through a stile and you meet the byway track from Foxley to Corston on the edge of Malmesbury common. Here turn left and in a few yards you will see the track into Bradfield Wood.

Like all woodland paths it will be muddy in wet weather. It's peaceful in the Wood and the track is well defined. Once again in the open field East Slade go straight ahead for 200 yards, cross the drainage ditch (there is a bridge) go through the gateway and follow the right-hand hedge. At the next ditch you are less than 100 yards from the outward path and may wish to re-join it, or you can take the cart track through several gateways to enter the large field Cowleaze again. There is no possibility of losing your way if you keep to the right of the yellow bungalow.

From here retrace your steps to the village.

I am a retired Anglican priest, and Helen and I have lived in the village for 21 years. We chose to move here whilst living in Married Quarters at RAF Lyneham. My first glimpse of the village was from 900 ft up from a tethered balloon at RAF Hullavington, as I made my first descent during TA parachute training in 1979. I was studying for a Master's degree at Nottingham University at the time and wanted some adventure! I count being awarded the coveted Red Beret as one the great-

est achievements of my life.

My life's dream was to join the RAF as a Chaplain. After a brief career in teaching, I trained for the ministry in Cambridge, before going on to serve in 2 parishes in South London - and in 1989 I finally joined the RAF. Our first posting was to RAF Lyneham, and over a period of 18 years we moved 13 times; our daughters were born in Berlin and Bedford. Returning from a Middle East detachment in 2002, I was posted back to RAF Lyneham, as Senior Chaplain. We naturally returned to Hullavington, where we have lived happily ever since. As teenagers, our girls often complained that we 'lived in the sticks'- yet as adults they much enjoy returning 'home' and keep up with all the news of Hullavington on Facebook.

On retiring from the RAF, Hullavington proved to be an excellent location for my new career as a Hospital Chaplain at RUH Bath where Helen and I both worked for 10 years.

I am an active member of the Gauzebrook Ministry team, taking services around our lovely villages and further afield. My time is also taken up with voluntary work: as a driver for Malmesbury Link, a Bereavement Volunteer for Cruse, and helping in the Malmesbury foodbank. We both enjoy e-biking with friends from the village. Our plans for retirement include overseas travel, and with our daughter and son-in-law now living in Singapore we are making inroads in to South East Asia and beyond.

I can't imagine who might play me in a film. And if I could change one thing in the village, it would be to have a decent footpath leading straight to The Tap. I'd invite Sandy Denny to dinner, with Rowan Williams and Bob Hoskins. My advice to my teenage self would be simply to 'work harder'! I'd like both a dog and a cat. My secret of happiness is 'wanting what you have – not vice versa. My bucket list destination would be to visit my mother's birthplace in Bombay.

ong standing villager David Hunt has thoughtfully taken photos of well known Hullavington landmarks over the years, so we are now lucky enough to benefit from some brilliant comparisons!

This editions' feature is... The Cottages in Hill Hayes Lane

(Or 'Hillayes' as the area is shown on old maps)

The 'then' photo was taken in 1987 when there were five separate cottages each with its own front porch. Old maps show, and even into the 1970s, the

area behind the cottages had allotments. I rented one in the mid 1970s and they were administered by a Mr Norris who lived in the furthest of the five cottages on behalf of the owner of the land who lived in Devon.

Unfortunately the two years I tried to cultivate my piece were the two hot dry summers of 1975 and 1976. There was no access to water on the site (the well had been filled in) and my crops were

not good. I must confess that I gave up. The entrance to the allotments was further down the road on the right about

where the small holding is now. As you walked up the path you passed on the left the wooden sheds still be-

ing used by old Mr Wicks the Hurdle Maker still producing his hand made hurdles. I remember them being stacked outside of the shed ready for delivery. Although I never witnessed it running I am sure that he had a stationary vertical Lister petrol engine in one if his sheds to provide power.
