It's lovely to see people making







# VILLAGE LIFE— Groups, Events & News

#### ROUNDABOUTS

It must be about 10 years since the suggestion of improvements at the junction of the A429 and C1(S) were brought to the Parish Council with a roundabout being the most popular solution. Despite repeated requests to Wiltshire Council Highways, nothing was done until 2017 when Dyson Technology Ltd. bought the airfield. The Masterplan was submitted to Wiltshire Council in 2017 and finally approved in August 2018.

Griffiths Civil Engineering and Construction were appointed as the contractors and work began in July last year. Every time I drove past the site I always considered it to be well organised and tidy. If I stopped to speak to any of the workers they were always most helpful. Despite having to work through some dreadful weather conditions the roadworks have been completed ahead of schedule and we have not just one but two roundabouts! All that remains to be done is the landscaping of the surrounding area. So, a big thank you to Dyson Technology Ltd. who gave the land and paid for the construction of the new road system for making the entrance to our village so much easier and safer. (*hear, hear! Ed*).

#### ELECTIONS

Would you would like to be a member of Hullavington Parish Council? You will be able to stand as a candidate (subject to the qualifying rules) for the election which is to be held on 6th May 2021. The deadline for submitting nominations is 4pm on Thursday 8 April 2021. Nomination packs are available online from 11th March 2021. Please click on this link for further guidance, nomination forms and the Election timetable.

The nomination papers will provide candidates with details of the information required and how to submit their application for candidacy. The forms must be hand delivered to the nominated office of the unitary authority by 4pm on Thursday 8th April 2021. Responsibility for this lies solely with the candidate, whether they are an existing councillor or are standing for the first time.

All those currently serving on the Parish Council will terminate their statutory period of office on the 10th of May. Following the election, those elected will then sign the Declaration of Acceptance of Office ready to start working for the village.

#### PARISH COUNCIL

Hullavington Parish Council meetings are usually held in the Village Hall on the second Wednesday of each month with the exception of August. Since last May, they have been held virtually by Zoom. Hopefully the meetings will return to the Village Hall by May or June 2021. Meetings start at 7.30pm and are usually finished by 9pm. They are open to the public and the press and there is a 10-minute slot (Public Question Time) at the start of each meeting for any comments or questions that parishioners may like to raise regarding items on the Agenda or any other issues.

However, being a Parish Councillor is not just about sitting around a table once a month - it is about knowing the village and being interested in those who live there and what their concerns are. A good Councillor is always "working in the background", ready to give their time listening to parishioners and advising them where to address problems that are not within the remit of the Parish Council.

Designated Councillors are involved in liaising with Wiltshire Council on various matters and with the Parish Steward; with the grass cutting contractor to ensure that the schedule is adhered to; carrying out various maintenance tasks free of charge - and in their own time (thus saving the parish money); removing any rubbish or litter from the cemetery on a regular basis, as this service is no longer provided by Wiltshire Council, and generally keeping an eye on the village. Councillors also attend various meetings arranged by Wiltshire Council, (usually held in Chippenham or the surrounding villages). New Councillors would also be expected to attend a Parish Councillors' Training Course

Councillors serve for a term of four years following an election and an election will take place on 6th May 2021. Lydia has offered to bring out prescribed medications and has been doing this for the last two weeks. How lucky are we? Can you please ensure that you have requested your medications, before you ring me to advise that you would like them brought out to the village. Those people who have paper prescriptions can still bring them to me and Lydia will hand them in to the Surgery.

A great big thank you to Jo and Wendy - and now Lydia for looking after our village residents so well, they are all most grateful.

Many of us will fondly remember Jean Coram from the days when the village Post Office was located in London House and she was our village Postmistress until 1999. I am sorry to have to inform you - if you are not already aware - that Jean passed away, "surrounded by love", at the age of 97, on Monday 1st February in the Care Home where she had been a resident for several years.

#### WALKING FOR TWO HOURS A DAY – JUST TO GET TO SCHOOL!

Major Khatri Chakrabahdur, is the OC 9RLC-90Sqn and he did just that in order to get an education which has led to where he is now! He is also the liaison officer between Buckley Barracks and the Parish Council. He and his personnel have supported the village and the school over the last couple of years by helping with events at the school and, most notably perhaps, in rigging the village Christmas tree in the Churchyard.

He was educated at the Shree Gupteshwor Secondary School, in a village in Oyam, a region in the East of Nepal, and he had to walk for two hours over mountainous terrain - in all weathers - to get the education which led to the position he has achieved today (coming up through the ranks) and then - walk home again! With the co-operation of Julie Exton, the then Mayor of Malmesbury, it was intended to hold a Ghurkha evening at the Town Hall in Malmesbury last April to raise funding for the school. It was also hoped that a Ghurkha evening could be held in Hullavington Village Hall. COVID-19 put paid to all of that!

He would now like to try another way of giving something back to the school where he was educated and has started PROJECT OYAM - in conjunction with The Pahar Trust Nepal - in order to raise money to provide a Memorial building, which will house various amenities that the school is lacking, a library, a computer room and, most importantly, hostel accommodation.



This would save these youngsters having to WALK for a total of FOUR hours each day just to get to and from school to be educated. #### **CLONE INVESTMENT SCAMS**

#### NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH WILTSHIRE

We're supporting the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) ScamSmart campaign to warn the public as reports of 'clone firm' investment scams continue to rise. We're also issuing advice for investors to help avoid fake firms.

Reports of investing with fraudsters imitating genuine investment firms in Wiltshire increased by 25% in one month alone from March to April 2020 when the UK first went into lockdown.

Data provided by Action Fraud shows a worrying picture: Victims reported losses of £4.3 million in Wiltshire between January and December 2020, resulting in an average loss of over £22,750 across 189 reports in total. Nationally £78 million has been stolen in 2020, with reported losses of more than £45,000 each on average.

Clone firms are fake firms set up by scammers using the name, address and 'Firm Reference Number' (FRN) of real companies authorised by the FCA. Fraudsters then send sales and marketing materials linking to websites of legitimate firms to dupe potential investors into thinking they are the real firm when they aren't.

We want to help prevent these scams and are advising anyone who is considering an investment opportunity to check the FCA's <u>Warning List</u> of firms which is updated daily. Don't deal with companies that are not authorised through the FCA, and verify their details through the <u>FCA Register</u> to make sure you're dealing with the bona fide firm.

In Wiltshire, those aged between 60 and 79 had a highest number of reports in the last year, with over 39% of victims within that age bracket and nearly two thirds (63%) of all victims were male. We're asking for people to be extra cautious and spread the word to friends and family. Investors can test if they can spot an investment scam from a smart investment by taking the Scam or Smart quiz, visit <u>www.fca.org.uk/scamsmart</u> to find out more. If you think you've already invested into a fraudulent scheme, report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040, or via their website at <u>www.actionfraud.police.uk</u>. We have been unable to meet at the village hall since December. Unfortunately, it will be at least June before we return.

Malmesbury Library has been open for click and collect so I have been able to obtain our monthly book choices. Kathryn has been very helpful, sourcing our books, supplying us with book lists and keeping me informed about availability. We will continue to support the mobile library service when it returns, possibly using both library systems.

To help pass the time during February, Sue Kelly, running with an idea from Denise, set up a book quiz for members. We were asked to list our ten favourite books and the other group members had to guess who the lists belonged to. Picking just ten titles was so difficult for all of us.

**In January we read 'The Bees**' by Laline Paull. This was a 'Marmite' book, some liked it, but most couldn't get on with the book at all and just had to give up.

**Reviews:** "Quite a sustained feat of imagination to produce a fulllength novel. Interesting to read about the complexities of bees' life cycle and social structure in this format when I would never have picked up a manual on bee-keeping.

Bit Orwellian at times.

Interesting to dive into Wikipedia to read a bit more about bees and how important they are.

They are very big business in USA. Millions of hives are hired by farmers and trucked across the country to enable fruit in New England and then on gradually across to almonds in California.

I remember a radio program about how the familiar Langstroth hive was a crucial invention as it allowed hives to become reusable and mobile instead of having to be destroyed to get the honey out.

I did think female bees were produced from fertilised eggs, so I am not sure how Flora got a daughter. Probably missed something somewhere.

Sir Linden literally went out with a bang!"

"My overall comment is stick with this surprising novel.

I must admit to having strong doubts as to whether I would last longer than the first couple of chapters as seeing the world through the eyes of a bee was not something I thought to find enthralling. However I was soon proved wrong.

The story follows Flora, a sanitation worker doomed by her birth to the lowest caste in her hive community. Yet despite this she thrives and excels at everything she sets her mind to and by the end of the novel you are left in awe, and no longer questioning is this really how bees live.

Not only is this novel a gripping story of a single bee's life, it is also an impossibly well-observed guide to the important role bees play in our human life.

In conclusion, If you give this novel a go you will never look at a bee, a spider, or a wasp in the same way again.'

"I got to page 217 and really could not face reading anymore. I did try reading the end to see if I might go back and try carrying on but I wasn't in any way inspired.

In one word it was: weird!

It's the only time I've given 1 star to a book on good reads. I always think of how deflated an author must feel seeing a bad review but on this occasion I could find no reason to give this book anything more.

Maybe it's because I'm not an insect lover?

I understand how important bees are in the natural world but really they have weird ceremonies in their hives and they chat with wasps on their travels and hide eggs away in case the fertility police bees find out? And as for their prayers (p32 as an example) how ridiculous - 'hallowed be thy womb'!!

Big thumbs down from me!"

**February saw us reading 'The Giver of Stars**' by Jojo Moyes. Written by an author popular with our group, the novel is based on fact. The WPA, (Works Progress Administration), ran from 1935 to 1943. At its height, the library service brought books to more than one hundred thousand rural residents in rural Kentucky. The female librarians who delivered books by pack horse were known as "Book Women", "Book Ladies" and "Packsaddle Librarians". This was a popular book with our group.

#### Reviews

"This historical novel is based on the real-life story of the packhorse librarians of Kentucky. It is a must for any lover of reading who understands the true joy and escapism books can bring to everyone.

The novel revolves around five women from diverse backgrounds and cultures unified by their desire to continue improving literacy and knowledge through books, despite constant resistance and personal challenges.

Set against a background of beautiful, lush descriptions of remote Kentucky, the novel explores such themes as misogyny, racism and poverty that remain relevant to this day.

A truly remarkable novel that illustrates beautifully both the power of books and the power of friendship."

"You could pick a lot of holes in it but by the end I found I had enjoyed it very much. Good story telling.

The first part, as the plot was being set up and characters like Mrs Brady, Porteous etc introduced, was a bit reminiscent of a 1950s Ealing comedy. Innocent, well-meaning eccentricity.

Although I thought she used the location well and the flood, in particular, was dramatically captured, the values the story reflected were imposed from a 21st Century liberal perspective. But then that liberal decency and the views on prejudice etc seemed to be compromised at the end by the acceptance of perjury justified by the pursuit of a happy ending.

She covered most of today's themes .... women, colour, economic equality, abuse, education etc ..... but, surprisingly, did not have a gay character, which is almost mandatory these days, although Bennett might be outed in a sequel! His motivations were never explored in the book or how he knew the sisters could help, but then it was not a book about him. The characters were a bit stereotyped. I thought I was meant to hiss and boo the villain, father Van Cleve, whenever he appeared. Right Said Fred would be played by James Stewart. Thought the two McCullough sisters were going to come out of their cabin playing Duelling Banjos from Deliverance.

There was a bit of controversy about Jojo's book. Another one, published a few months before, **The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek** by Kim Michele Richardson, covers the same time period, is also set in eastern Kentucky and is about the packhorse library women. The book also partly features the **Blue People of Kentucky**, based on a real family who due to a genetic trait, had blue skin (some pictures on Google). Different sort of colour prejudice! It also starts with a women on a mule in the mountains delivering books. Finds a body, not a drunken hillbilly.

Enjoyed it as something completely different and got drawn into the story.

Talk of plagiarism towards Jojo Moyes never came to anything." This would have been a super topic to discuss at a meeting. Perhaps we can do so at a later date.



#### Type 2 diabetes—It's time to get serious

It's very important that you find out if you are at high risk of Type 2 diabetes so you can get support to lower your risk. You may even be eligible for your free local Healthier You NHS Diabetes Prevention Programme. The Diabetes UK risk tool can help you find out if you're at risk of developing the condition. It takes just a few minutes and could be the most important thing you do today. 

## FAVOURITE RECIPE

Easy Carrot cake

- 230ml veg oil
- 100g natural yoghurt
- 4 large eggs
- 1.5 tsp vanilla extract
- .5 zested orange
- 265g sr flour
- 335g light muscovado sugar
- 2.5 tsp ground cinnamon, .25 fresh nutmeg
- 3 grated carrots
- 100g sultanas, 100g walnuts or pecans
- Icing—100g salted butter, 300g icing sugar, 100 soft cheese

Heat the oven to 180c. Oil and line two 20cm cake tins or 1 large one (and slice the sponge in two). Whisk the oil, yogurt, eggs, vanilla and zest in a jug. Mix in the flour, sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg.

Add the wet ingredients to the dry, along with the carrots, raisings and half the nuts. Mix and divide between the tins.

Bake for 30 ish minutes. Leave to cool in the tins.

For the icing, beat the butter and sugar until smooth, add half the soft cheese and beat again; then add the rest.

Remove the cakes from the tins and sandwich together with half of the icing. Top with the remaining and scatter with walnuts.



## HULLAVINGTON HISTORY—THEN AND NOW

'Then' was taken in 1988 from opposite the bus shelter, it shows the original Lawn Farm buildings in Frog Lane. At that time, the walled area was completely grass apart from a couple of young trees. The wall was built in the 1950s. On old maps of the village, this area is shown as The Green but in the 1970s, the Parish Council made the decision that the area on the left as you enter the village from the Malmesbury end should also be known as The Green (formerly referred to as the Pond Site). The 'Now' photograph shows the houses that have replaced the farm buildings which were demolished in 2014. In the autumn of 2005, the walled area was rotavated at the instigation of the Hullavington WI and the area planted by the WI. with shrubs and bulbs. Dave Hunt
