

Shingles vaccination

**SHINGLES**—Is not funny at any age but as we get older the after effects can last for a long time. Hopefully, all those in the village between the ages of 70 to 79 will have received a letter from the Care Centre calling them forward for vaccination.

#### LED STREET LAMPS

Good news from Wiltshire Council regarding Climate Change. The village is doing its part

of course as, following a consultation with residents a couple of years ago, the village opted to change to Part Night Lighting of the village street lamps.

Since then some of you may have noticed that all our street lamps have been converted to LED units. Each street lamp may have different outputs depending on the road illumination class, existing spacing etc. This means that the standard dimming operation is Full Output from dusk to 8pm, with 75% output between 8pm and midnight when they will then turn off - apart from ones at junctions and cul-de-sacs.

#### WILTSHIRE COUNCIL CLIMATE CHANGE

We're delighted to have received an excellent rating of 81% in Climate Emergency UK's Council Climate Plan Scorecards, ranking us as the fifth best unitary authority in the UK for our response to climate change. Wiltshire Council rated as fifth best unitary authority for climate change strategies and received an excellent rating of 81% in Climate Emergency UK's Council Climate Plan Scorecards published 27 January 2022.

The scorecards are a wholly independent assessment of the climate plans and strategies of councils around the country, with each council being rated against nine different categories, including governance; engagement and communications; setting targets and more.

Wiltshire scored maximum points for the community, engagement and communications; ecological emergency; and cobenefits criteria, and also scored highly across the other categories to receive an overall rating of 81%. The average rating for unitary authorities was 50%. The council's two key environmental strategies - the Climate Strategy and Wiltshire's Natural Environment Plan, will be considered by Full Council on 15 February for final approval and adoption.

Cllr Nick Botterill commented "We recognise that there is more to do, but as this scoring shows, we're making huge progress and leading the way when it comes to tackling climate change." To see the full Council Climate Plan Scorecards, people should go to <u>Council Climate Plan Scorecards</u>.

#### HULLAVINGTON VILLAGE HALL

#### Farming and the environment in harmony

It's been great to see the amount of interest and activity in the village regarding supporting nature and wildlife. We all try to do our bit in our gardens, but the biggest impact can be from large land-owners. I was delighted to be invited to spend some time with the Hawker family recently, who own Gardner's farm – and to hear about their approach.



Gardner's farm has been under the care of the Hawker family since the 1950's when they were originally tenants of Eton College. The farm has grown steadily since that time and is now approximately 1500 acres in size.

If you've walked past the Farm, you'll notice the milking herd that total almost 400, calmly making their way to the milking parlour. The parlour is currently being upgraded to the latest technology. Solar panels on the shed roofs and LED light fittings make it as efficient as possible; it has already won many awards from the premium supermarket that they supply milk and Aberdeen Angus to.

The farm is driven by an ethos of sustainability and encouraging nature. This can sometimes come at a cost in terms of reduced profit but it's not an area the Hawkers are prepared to compromise on. Since the early 2000's, many changes have been made and a Higher Level of Stewardship; now Countryside Stewardship, level attained. The farm also exceeds the Red Tractor standard. Stanton Wood is a good example of how proactive changes have impacted the area. Although it's frustrating for people to see areas they used to be able to access with their dogs are now fenced off, the flipside is that now it's a conservation area, with improved biodiversity and a huge increase of ground nesting birds; now that they're undisturbed.

There are some downsides to farming of course, rural crime is on the increase; gateways have to be blocked by logs – just recently 4 sets of gates have been driven through and smashed by hare coursers and GPS units have been stolen from tractors. A commitment to the farm means no holidays for more than 10 years, but the Hawkers aren't complaining, it's a vocation.

After many years of effort, the farm now has some impressive environmental statistics: 13 ponds exist – some being created to provide habitat for great crested newts, 152 acres of native woodland with all deadwood timber left to create habitat for invertebrates, bats and woodpeckers, butterfly glades, wildflower meadows.

There are 8.5 acres of semi improved grassland using nectar flower mix, 2 acres of ditch/stream areas, 4 beetle banks, more than 48 acres of floristically enhanced buffer strips, tussock grass and

woodland edge buffers. Hedges are left shaggy on a 2-3 year rotation to provide food and shelter for birds and pollinators, participation in the annual bird count (over 55 species counted including some red listed), tree sparrow & barn owl boxes and bee hotels are dotted around the farm.

In total 322 acres (22%) of the land farmed is in environmental management.

**FIBRE OPTIC UPGRADE:** If you are a member of the Community Partnership you will have received our latest Keeping in touch email. We are anticipating the OpenReach survey soon and once completed we will be pressing forward as quickly as possible.

**Calling all tenants and landlords in Hullavington**, please get in touch, we really don't want you to lose out. We have special information packs for you pass on to your landlords.

Both housing associations in the village, White Horse and Green Square Accord, have also confirmed their tenants are free to proceed with the upgrade, so make sure you don't lose out on this government funded upgrade.

If you haven't yet signed up to join the upgrade here are just 4 reasons why you shouldn't delay;

1] The upgrade and your connection to it is funded by the government

2] Fast broadband costs the same as slow broadband

3] Fast broadband does what it says on the tin so if you pay for 60 mbps you get 60 mbps

4] The copper network which we all currently use is being discontinued, so you will eventually have to connect, and if you wait to connect it won't be government funded

**FOOTPATHS:** Twenty Hullavington residents have combined to form the Hullavington Footpath Group. Our main aim is to enjoy, preserve, improve and promote the footpaths and other Public Rights of Way in and around Hullavington. With support from Wiltshire Council's Countryside Access Team, our activities are wide ranging, from footpath working groups, to organised walk events. The benefits we hope to achieve include:

• Improvements that allow more people to enjoy the paths

• Maintaining and improving links to local facilities and neighbouring communities

• Meeting like-minded people and enhancing our sense of neighbourliness

• Exploring our surroundings, enjoying the beautiful Wilt-shire countryside

• Getting and staying healthy

Sociable physical activities with heavy and light tasks, learning practical skills. If you support these aims, you'll be most welcome to join us - please see our contact details below.

**BIODIVERSITY: Ben Raskin,** author, podcaster, Head of Horticulture and Agroforestry at the Soil Association and local Dad gave a popular talk on wilding our gardens in the village hall. A timely start to planning our gardens this year.

If you are interested in all things wild in our community, then do take a look at the Hullavington Wildlife Facebook page for plenty of advice and ideas.

On the 2<sup>nd</sup> March, Chippenham Town Council voted through the new Grass Cutting policy created in conjunction with Wiltshire Wildlife trust. This includes the creation and encouragement of new wildflower areas.

As they banned Glyphosate usage in the Ecological emergency declaration last year, the wildflower areas will be created with manual methods. It's a small act of democracy, but somehow that seems more important than ever.

Paradoxically, the new roundabouts near M4 Karting junction, have been seeded with low maintenance grass seed!

We now have a detailed report from Wessex Water on the quality of the Gauze Brook. It doesn't make for good reading. I have asked what more we can do as a community and am waiting to hear more. **POSH UPDATE**: "Provide a Public Open Space suitable for all the community to use, to incorporate a large playground and village playing field with sports facilities" - Neighbourhood Plan (page 30 ref 7.08)

Where are we now? - It is now clear that the open space that will be a part of the development by the school, will not be able to provide space needed for community facilities in the way we had hoped. The initial proposals from the developer included a large drainage pond, compromising the area's useability and its value to the community.

Last February, there was an amazing and overwhelming community response objecting to the proposed plans and since then POSH has worked hard to ensure your voice remained as a central part of the planning process.

This has resulted in revised plans, crucially with a smaller drainage pond with sympathetic planting. So, although it's not what we were aiming for, this revision will allow the remaining land to be developed into a wildlife area, fully accessible to the community, and will provide the community with a valuable public open space.

However, that leaves us with a challenge - We must still find a home for all the facilities we need but don't currently have - a village field providing a community space for fetes, local and national celebrations such as the Jubilee etc., as well as sports facilities, and a large playground.

It was agreed that the Parish Council will support the Group on speaking to the Landowners seeking land for recreation and sports provision. It was agreed that no financial commitment is to be made with the Landowners on behalf of the Parish Council. **ENERGY PROJECT:** The Government's Climate Change Committee is recommending the phasing out of new oil boilers by 2028, and discussions are underway to see if this date can be brought forward.

The majority of us in Hullavington rely on oil heating and so will need to switch over to renewable energy sooner rather than later. To avoid anyone getting left behind, and to make the process as cost effective and efficient as possible, it would be ideal if we could make this transition together as a village. Some preliminary work has been done to identify a consultant who can help us pull together a plan, but we need someone to lead this workstream, with the support of other villagers, so please do get in touch if you'd be interested in learning more.

Also, if you are thinking of updating your home insulation, then a thermal camera is invaluable. Sustainable Sherston has organised the purchase of one of these valuable bits of tech and you can hire it for £10 for 24 hours. Interested? Contact Debbie Lawley below.

## HULLAVINGTON HISTORY—THEN AND NOW



The original Village Green area - This month's then picture was taken by Eric Gough in the mid 1950s. It's behind the bus shelter and was originally known as The Green. The part shown in the photograph was walled in the 1950s and was pleasantly laid out with a seat, grass and small rose gardens. The building on the left is the pub with its sign 'the Queens Head Inn' on the top of a post set into the pavement. Sadly the Queens Head closed a number of years ago. On the right is the back of the bus shelter, built in 1953 to commemorate the Coronation of our Queen Elizabeth II.

In times past, most villages had a village pound, a small walled area used to house stray animals, either found in the village streets or in other farmer's fields. The owners could retrieve them from the pound but often at a small fee, the fee being used for the pound's upkeep.

Hullavington was no exception in having its pound, and it was in this same area just to the right going into Watts Lane. In the distance in the picture can be seen the village telephone box. At that time it was a very important village utility. It was not easy to repeat the high angle for my 'now' photograph, but it does show how attractive the walled area is looking at present with the early spring flowers. As I mentioned in a previous article it had a complete makeover in 2006 at the hands of the WI, and another more recently for which we can give thanks to Jo Martin and John Granger. *Dave Hunt*

#### HULLAVINGTON BOOK GROUP



#### January 'Force of Nature' by Jane Harper

The second book by Jane Harper after the success of 'The Dry', which we had read previously.

"A good book to occupy a day or two reading on holiday."

"If the idea of a team building event with your work colleagues fills you with dread then reading this novel will only reinforce your worst nightmare. Having now read several of Jane Harper's novels I was once again captured with the question of just who did it and why!! Harper has an ease of style that evokes unease and fear. All the women are flawed and rather more unpleasant than pleasant, which in many ways makes the novel more intense."

"A good fast-paced read."

"If people liked it they may wish to read The Lost Man by the same author. I thought that one was excellent. I really enjoyed this book. The author's descriptions of the area were very good, easy to conjure up a picture of the terrain involved. The characters all seemed very believable and the story reached a satisfactory conclusion. I never wished to go on any team building exercise when I worked and am rather glad I won't ever have to now! It reminded me of Lord of the Flies."

#### February 'The Marble Collector' by Cecelia Ahern

At the March meeting, the group enjoyed an excellent discussion about 'The Marble Collector', including how difficult it could be to hide 'another life' from your family—in this case, collecting and the playing of games with marbles. We also talked about other games, less popular in modern times, including 'shove ha'penny'.

"The story tells of a father and daughter, as the father, suffering from post stroke memory loss, comes to the end of a life, of which he actually remembers very little. His daughter is triggered to discover his past life when she receives several crates of his belongings, in particular an extensive and valuable collection of marbles, of which she had no knowledge.

The first part of the book seemed to me to be fairly mundane and even pedestrian. Cecelia Ahern has probably written better novels than this one. Towards the end the novel comes more to life and she shows she can write, especially in the key scene where Sabrina, the daughter, finds the pub where her father won the World Marbles Championship and meets the fellow members of the team. All this he had kept secret from his family. The underlying themes of what memory actually is and what even close relations never know about each other are touched on but the emphasis on marbles as a literary device does not really bear the weight the author puts on it."

"The novel takes you on a bitter sweet journey following a daughter's surprise discovery of her father's marble collection. The story is made all the more poignant by her father's severe stroke and loss of memory that forces her on a journey of surprising discovery.

The secrecy around Fergus' double life at times seemed rather baffling and Sabrina's reaction and angst somewhat over the top. However it does beg the, question of exactly how well we know and understand our loved ones and ourselves.

Overall I found the novel rather hard going especially at the start, and the switching between characters chapter by chapter seemed rather confusing but I am glad I stuck with it."

#### March—'Where the Crawdads Sing' by Delia Owens

'For years, rumours of the 'Marsh Girl' have haunted Barkley Cove, a quiet town on the North Carolina coast. So in late 1969, when handsome Chase Andrews is found dead, the locals immediately suspect Kya Clark, the so-called Marsh Girl. But Kya is not what they say. The time comes when she yearns to be loved. When two young men from town become intrigued by her wild beauty, Kya opens herself to a new life - until the unthinkable happens.'





### WALKS AROUND HULLAVINGTON - Jon Atkey

#### Walk Four - Over the Downs to Corston - Distance: 5 Miles

This issue's chosen walk takes you along a gentle ridge with fine views, known locally as "The Downs", to the neighbouring village of Corston. There you can enjoy a drink at the Radnor Arms before returning along the Gauze Brook valley.

1. Starting by Hullavington Garage, go down Frog Lane and take the footpath at its end. Just before the camp boundary fence, cross the stile on your left and follow the path through a gap in the hedge opposite.

2. Continue along the path, now with the hedge on your right. At the end of the field, cross the stile and footbridge on the right to continue in the same general direction, along the boundary fence to follow a narrow path for about another 100 yards before emerging into a large field on your right.

3. Follow along the edge of the field, now with a hedge and the little stream on your left. The Stile at the far end leads you into an old marshy track Watery Lane and, after another 100 yards, you climb a stile to emerge onto the main road out of the village.

4. With great regard for road safety, turn right and then left to follow the small back-road to Malmesbury for a few yards. At the first bend of the road, go straight ahead to enter the field across the stile by the gateway.

5. With the hedge on your left, proceed for ¼ mile until you enter a small patch just before the track goes under the rail-way through "Chowell Bridge". When you emerge at the other side into "Chowell Mead", take the stile and the footbridge on the right by the gateway and turn left.

6. Two stiles are very evident as you cross old pastures into a larger field which you traverse bearing diagonally left to the corner to cross a stile and a footbridge into the next field. The field route now runs parallel to the A429 over The Downs, with good views of the surrounding countryside.

7. As you keep the hedge on your left, the path along the next field ends in a small thicket, which you pass through, also cross-

ing the Parish Boundary into St Paul Malmesbury Without, and then gently downhill to a gate into the next field. The path at this stage has a boundary fence on your right as you cross a field about 1¼ mile long.

8. At the end you will see a gate which leads you across a field for about 200 yards, over the stile and into a small hawthorn and hazel copse. Go straight ahead and after 100 yards you will be out of this, cross a stile, descend a grassy slope with a very nice children's playground to the main road. The Radnor Arms is 100 yards on your right. Enjoy!



9. From the Radnor Arms, walk 200-300 yards towards Malmesbury, over the bridge, then turn left into Mill Lane. In another 200-300 yards you will pass some old cottages and the old mill. Soon you will see the on your left a bridleway, which you follow with the Gauze Brook first on your left and then on your right. The bridleway runs lower and parallel to the outward path.

10. Pass through a gate, then follow the left-hand hedge until it becomes a boundary fence. Take the gate in this fence into the adjoining field and cross to the hunting gate at the end into a larger field. At this gate you re-enter Hullavington Parish. As the ground rises, you will see the beginning of the old cart track Down Lane, which will take you back to Cemetery Corner. You then continue straight on up The Street to your starting point.

# A light hearted chat with a local about their time in Hullavington

In this edition we meet Simon Durrant



We moved to Hullavington from Scotland in 1998, having previously lived in Biddestone when our children were young.

I was staying with Anna's parents and looking at houses with Anna's mother as surrogate Anna. We just fell for the house. There was nothing else we wanted. The Cullums who lived there at the time wouldn't take our offer until Anna flew down to see the house. Then our sale fell through so we had to pull out. Then we sold and John Cullum called and offered us a lower price if we could close. Lots of stress for Anna but it was better in the end.

I like that Hullavington is "real". Not pretty enough to have lots of second homes and so everyone lives here and works here, or from here. The proximity of the open farmland is great although, sadly, the decline in wildlife has been evident while we have lived here. I think there is an increasing energy in the village now, with lots more people getting involved, creating initiatives, which is great. If urban living is about amenities; access to shops, cinema etc then village life is about community. Hullavington is a great place with some great people, so get involved.

I am involved with the village hall—I had a 'foggy moment' and went from being a member of the Village Hall management team to being the chair! Anna has been secretary for about 20 years and I've been a member for about 8 years. This coincided with a number of long serving members of the committee leaving, so we have built a largely new team.

I see the village hall as an asset for the whole community and some of the changes we have made are intended to make the hall more available to more users. I work from home but must confess I don't work that often. I do some woodwork and do a lot of DIY (ancient homes are lovely to live in but do need a lot of TLC!). I'm also on the Friday coffee morning rota in the church. I'm interested in audio and do recordings of any concerts, local events and "things". One example of that is a recording on the Gauze brook at dawn that I did last May.

I was asked about anecdotes I might like to share; I was chatting with the late Victor Rawlins of Mays Farm and he mentioned going to Surrendell Farm on his tractor to do some ploughing. "They never had a stitch on!" said Victor.
