

SWEET and SAVOURY



Green Bean Chutney

This is a wonderful recipe for when you have a glut of runner beans or even if you need to source from your local farm shop or supermarket. You will enjoy the effort of your endeavour throughout the summer and winter months when accompanied by cheese or cold meats.

Ingredients

2lbs (900g) Runner beans (trimmed & sliced)

1 1/2lbs (700g) chopped onions

1 heaped tbs cornflour

1 tbs turmeric

1 heaped tbs dry English mustard

1lb Demerara sugar

1lb soft brown sugar

1 1/2pt (850ml) malt vinegar

Salt

<u>Method</u>

Put chopped onions into a preserving pan or saucepan with 10floz (275ml) of the vinegar and simmer gently for 20 mins until onions are soft.

Cook sliced beans in boiling salted water for 10 mins, strain and put aside In a small basin mix together cornflour, mustard, turmeric with a small amount of vinegar - enough to make a paste - add to onion mix.

Add rest of vinegar and simmer for 10 mins.

Add beans and both lots of sugar until dissolved and simmer for a further 15mins Pot the pickle in sterilised jars and seal once cold.

Keep for at least a month before eating

On a sunny day an outside table near the river is lovely, although food orders need to be placed at the bar so queuing can be a bit if an issue.

The menu is wide and varied and they even offer a separate vegan menu.

Options, ranging from pizzas to fillet steak, sea bass to burgers, provides something for everyone. 'The dirty burger' proved very popular with our party.

Councillors Questions

with Nick Botterill

he last few weeks have been perhaps my busiest on the council since I was elected in May 2021. After several years of input, the **draft Local Plan** was published on 3 July. This is the template for how Wiltshire develops socially, economically and environmentally over the coming years to 2038.

The first thing I would say is that it has been increasingly apparent to lots of people that the scale of new building seen over the past few years, concentrated in the largest towns in the county, was not sustainable. In the event the evidence supported this view and the established need for new housing up to 2038 in Wiltshire is for around 9,000 less new homes than previously predicted. I think it is important that new houses are only built where there is clear and demonstrable need, but not large numbers in excess of this. Together with the phasing of new developments the practical effect is that annual house building over the coming years should fall by around 35% in Wiltshire from the levels seen over the last few years. All towns and large villages have housing quotas set (under national rules) – but you may be interested to know that Hullavington's is entirely fulfilled by the Hannick Homes development known locally as 690 i.e. the net requirement is 0.

40% of all new homes will be for the 'affordable' designation and all new buildings will be expected to meet stringent new standards so that they are as close to zero carbon as possible. An ambitious requirement of 20% biodiversity net gain will also be required for all new developments. While there are sites allocated around existing settlements for new homes, the emphasis is very much on using the previously developed 'brown field' sites first.

As if it wasn't enough to have the draft Local Plan, the first week in July also sees the final financial outturn from last year 2022/23 published. The council is showing a small (well relative to expenditure!) overspend of £1.8m or equivalent to about 0.4% of the net budget i.e. 99.6% of expenditure was within budget. In the circumstances of sharply rising inflation, I think it is fair to say that this is a very good outcome and means that costs are being kept under control and residents' money is being used effectively. Mindful of what I said in this column last time, I also hope to be able to announce soon a material increase in the road resurfacing programme in my next update. Forgive me for addressing mostly countywide issues this time – as always I am very keen to hear from you about any issues of local concern.

We strongly feel it important to make sure our direction and focus was useful and reflected community priorities.

Thank you to 40 or so people who took time to join the 3 HCG members who ran the meeting. It was fantastic to see so many faces both familiar and new, all passionate about contributing to our amazing community. And huge thanks to the Church for hosting.

Unsurprisingly Public Open Space remains a huge priority, with anger expressed regarding the public open space and play facilities that are currently on offer. This will be taken up in the Reserved Matters Stage (coming up) of the planning process

The next 3 priorities (as voted by those present) were clear.

The desire to do something / anything to facilitate the reopening of the pub.

Wanting Rights of Way to be better maintained, and where possible upgraded. Especially try to enhance the safety of the route to Brookside and beyond.

And lastly is the complete and utter lack of facilities for children / young adults, this was very strongly backed by many of the older villagers who could

remember having many more opportunities when growing up here.

It is especially important if doing anything for this age group that it is something they want, and feel is theirs. So, on 6 July we held our first 11 - 18 's consultation. a massive thank you to the Village Hall for providing the venue.

A huge shout out to the boys who came with amazing ideas. They broke a widely held perceived notion that teenagers only ever moan, and whinge, but can't be bothered to do anything constructive.

They were thoughtful, and their ideas will be taken forward and discussed with Wiltshire Council in the next couple of weeks.

Fibre Optic Upgrade -We are waiting a final funding decision and as soon as we have news you will be the first ones to know.

POSH- will be meeting with County Councillors and Wiltshire Council Officers in the next couple of weeks to find a solution to this intractable problem.

The Hullavington Community Group, in conjunction with the Biological Records Office for North Wilts & Swindon and Wiltshire Wildlife, has organised a Wildlife Survey which everyone can join in.

Using free Apps on our Smartphones, anyone can submit their sightings of the lovely plants and beasties in our parish, just take a photo in the App it does the rest, from snails to butterflies and moths, insects of all sorts to birds, hares, and deer.

You can follow or click on this link if viewing the electronic version of the newswletter https://observation.org/groups/3478/invite/6c5aab4e-07d8-40eb-aaf1-a1c865594cd9/ and start collecting your records. Or if you are reading a printed copy you can use this QR code.



The product we are using is called **Obsidentify**. It accurately takes your photos, identifies what you are looking at and ena-

bles you to upload your sightings to our Group listing. If your mobile phone coverage is poor, you can still take the photos, but wait to upload your sightings at home.

Birds are harder to photograph and so please use the <u>Merlin App</u> – again it is free. Just switch on identify with sound and let your phone listen to and record the bird song. Then email your sightings (or listening's!) with date and place to <u>debbie1.lawley@gmail.com</u>.

If you are a knowledgeable twitcher, then please just send me your sightings (date, time, place (preferably latitude & longitude) and species) – you don't need to use the App. And you can drop a note through my door if you haven't got email – just call me on 07976 206095.



A tense thriller which kept us guessing.




Review: "An interesting psychological thriller but solid rather than edge of seat stuff. July: The Dictionary of Lost Words by Pip Williams

A novel based on real events. Esme spends her childhood at her father's feet as he and his team gather words for the very first Oxford English Dictionary. One day, she sees a slip of paper containing a forgotten word flutter to the floor unclaimed.


In 1857, 'The Unregistered Words Committee of the Philological Society of London' called for a New English Dictionary to replace Samuel Johnson's 'Dictionary of the English Language' of 1755. Professor James Murray was appointed as editor of 'The Oxford English Dictionary' in 1879.

Murray started the project within a corrugated outbuilding, 'The Scriptorium', in his

Oxford garden. This building was lined with wooden planks, bookshelves and pigeon-holes for the quotation slips. He appealed, through newspapers distributed to bookshops and libraries, for readers to report "as many quotations as you can for ordinary words" and for "rare, obsolete, old-fashioned, new peculiar or used in a peculiar way". These quotations were to be sent in on slips of a specific size to fit into the pigeon-holes in the Scriptorium.

Film of the Book

To tie in with 'The Dictionary of Lost Words' In July, the film of the book was 'The Professor and the Madman. Starring Mel Gibson as Professor Murray, this is a 2019 biographical film based on the book 'The Surgeon of Crowthorne'.



In 1872, retired United States Army surgeon William Chester Minor suffers hallucinations, and during one of these visions, he mistakenly chases and kills innocent stranger George Merritt. For this crime he was deemed insane and sent to Broadmoor. A prolific reader, William Minor contributed more than ten thousand quotations for the Oxford Dictionary.

The Book Group meets in the side room at the village hall at 2.00 pm on the second Tuesday of each month.

Film of the Book evenings are held in the side room on the first Wednesday of the month. Due to space, seats need to be booked in advance. If a larger audience is anticipated, we use the main hall. Please let us know if you would be interested in attending these evenings.

THIS EDITION : BUCKLEY BARRACKS

ome of 9 Theatre Logistics Regiment, previously known as Hullavington Barracks and before that RAF Hullavington.. However where does the name Buckley come from ? Members of the Regiment will be able to confirm that in 2003 the barracks were re-named after John Buckley VC.

A famous soldier who won one of the very first of many Victoria Crosses awarded during the Indian Mutiny. Buckley was born in 1813 in Cheshire, aged 18 he joined the Bengal Artillery and sent to India. Unfortunately he suffered a tragic family life losing his wife and two children to disease. He remarried but his child from the first marriage and two sons from his second marriage also died in 1853.

In 1857 Buckley was appointed Assistant Commissioner of Ordnance at the Delhi Magazine which was attacked by mutineers later that year. Buckley decided to blow up the ammunition storehouse (and himself) which was being defended against overwhelming numbers. Luckily he survived but was captured by the enemy and soon learned his entire family had been ruthlessly killed by the rebels. He had lost two wives and all his children.

Buckley later escaped , re-joined the British army and was part of the operations that captured the rebels from the Delhi Magazine incident. For their heroic action Buckley and the two remaining survivors of the Delhi Magazine were awarded the VC in 1858 . Buckley's medals are held in the Royal Logistics Corps Museum in Deepcut Barracks ,Camberley.

Sadly he died alone in 1876 and was buried in a pauper's grave in Tower Hamlets. In 2012 a local woman found his unmarked grave and following a campaign a new headstone was erected on the site of Major Buckleys grave.


As well as maintaining the fabric of the building, the church has a commitment to charitable giving. Last year our locally nominated charity was the *Brighter Futures* programme at Swindon Great Western Hospital. In 2023 funds will be donated to *Doorway*, an organisation supporting homeless and marginalised people, based in Chippenham and, further afield, the national charity we will be supporting between 2023-26 is *Spear Bristol*, which supports young people facing challenging circumstances to get into work, or re-enter education.

Walk Ten – Surrendell and Dunley Wood – Distance: 5 miles

This month's selection from *Walks Around Hullavington* explores the interesting and varied countryside to the west of the village. Starting from the Street, go down Parsons Walk. At the end of the path go through the kissing gate and straight on across Court Field keeping to the right of the electricity pole. This is gently uphill for most of the way. After crossing the stile go down the field and out of the gate at the bottom left corner. Turning right here, the track then takes you to the bridge over Gauze Brook at Danes Bottom.



Cross the stone bridge and then turn immediately left to follow the Gauze Brook to the other end of the field. Cross the dilapidated stone stile to the path with the hedge on your right and with the course of the Gauze Brook in the valley to your left. Cross the stile to cross the field Davies Dean to the stile by the metal gate beyond. If you look carefully, you can still see the remains of medieval ridge and furrow cultivation in this field. Cross the stile and turn right to pass Surrendell House on your left.

From Surrendell House, bear left along the track to Surrendell Farm. In the field on the left just after the grid, look out for an ancient Standing Stone under a hawthorn bush, known locally as "The Roman's Grave". Lore and legend maintain that it should never be ploughed up.

Just before the gates to Surrendell Farm, there is a gate on your left that leads into a pasture Cow Ground. Go through it and walk along the farm house garden boundary keeping it on your right until you pass through another gate. There are some good views here down into the valley cut over the centuries by the Gauze Brook.

Once through this gate head towards the metalled track and follow it to the end where it joins with a tarmac drive heading left. Follow the drive left past the converted barn and the large house (once was 2 farm cottages) on your left.

Take the bridleway to the left. Along the edge of The Forty Acres and enter Dunley Wood about 400 yards ahead. The old cart track is clearly defined here with steep gradients.

Note the attractive old bridge as you cross the upper reaches of the Gauze Brook, which runs through the wood, although it's usually dry for half the year. The wood is a haven for rabbits, foxes and badgers, as well as pheasants and many different kinds of birds. If you're lucky you might see a roe deer.

The track leaves the wood, becoming double-hedged and eventually joins the bridleway and access road to Roberts Berry Farm (formerly Clapcote) turn left towards Roberts Berry Farm following the bridleway. Follow the bridleway to the farm, it goes between the farm buildings with the old farm house on your right. At the end of the track, you'll see a modern dwelling on the right and a gate straight ahead, go through it into the field and look for another gate about 20 yards on the right which takes you into a small field. Head diagonally left to the visible stile at the top of this field and cross into the next field. From here the actual footpath goes diagonally left for about 200 yards to the gate (but it is often easier to walk around the edge of the field keeping the hedges on your right) that leads on to Pig Lane where you re-enter Hullavington Parish.

You now have a choice. By road, you turn left and then right in about ¼ mile to follow the winding Vlow Lane for ¾ mile back to the village via Gardners Farm. Otherwise, you cross the road into the fields beyond and by a series of zigzagging paths around Hullavington Field shown on the map, you should emerge from Water Furrows onto the Grittleton road. Turn left and it is ¼ mile back to the village.

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

hen we moved to Hullavington in 1998 with one child in Hullavington primary school and two in Malmesbury Secondary School, I decided I wanted to do something for myself, aside from housekeeping and childminding, so I went to Trowbridge College to take a City and Guilds evening course in photography.

From the age of 10 I have always loved photography and I learned how to process B&W film from my father who had his own darkroom. As I was quite academic at school, I went on to get a degree in Electronics and Electrical Engineering at Bath University where I very soon met my husband Simon.

At Trowbridge college I quickly realised that my strength in photography was people oriented - I really don't have the patience to wait for just the right light for that special landscape image (and I definitely can't get up at the crack of dawn!) or for the dedication needed to get the best picture of a robin or a hare, for example.

Slowly, over the years, I discovered more about how to consistently take good pictures of people and develop the people skills to do so. My venture into becoming a Sole Trader started when I was asked to photograph a christening, and it went on from there. I now photograph families, weddings, dance schools, events and passport pictures; in the past I also taught portrait photography at Lacock Photography and I took the annual pictures for Hullavington School until Covid times. I don't have my own dedicated studio and so mostly work on location, usually chosen by my clients.

I have made many lovely friends through photography and I love that children that I photographed 20 years ago are now coming to me with their children!

London House – The Post Office By David Hunt

he first picture, taken in 1999, is of London House, almost opposite the church, when It was the village post office. Note the entrance from the pavement to the left, the bright Post Office sign above the door, and the post box in the wall to the right.

It was run by Mr and Mrs Coram although in the latter years it was just Mrs Coram following the death of her husband. Originally it had been more



than just a post office, more a general store, even selling toys.

In the early 1980s the Corams decided that they would cut back to being just a basic



Having lived in Parklands she subsequently moved moved down to the West Country, where she died just a view years ago.

The second picture shows Mrs Coram behind the counter of the Post Office just days before her retirement.

Post Office. The toys were passed to the village school to sell to raise school funds.

Mrs Coram finally decided to retire in 1999. At that point the Post Office was moved to its current location in the village garage under the ownership of Howard Greenman. The first customer at the counter on opening day was Mrs Coram!
