





The Hullavington Half & 5K

The 16th May saw the third running of the Hullavington Half Marathon & 5K fun run. We had to stage the event in accordance with social distancing guidelines and adhering to the rule-of-six we set off fifty waves with five runners in each.

First back were the 5K runners who enjoyed the flat fast course through the village via Parklands and looping around Surrendell. Returning to take the victory was last year's winner, Ben Coles of Swindon Harriers who recorded a time of 15-minutes and 26seconds which equates to a pace of 4-minutes 58-seconds per mile!!! In the runners up spots were his club mates Courtenay

Chessell and Garv O'Brien. The first three Ladies also had a very close race with Rosie Oates of Cirencester RSE just ahead of Deborah Hunt from Bristol & West AC and Elizabeth Wainwright of Swindon Harriers.



The Half Marathon does a short loop around Parklands before heading out of the village and on through Norton before picking up the Fosseway. The runners then pass through Alderton, Littleton Drew and Grittleton before reaching the Hullavington Arms to receive their specially minted spinning medal and cake provided by the team at the Pub.

First runner back in a rapid 70-minutes and 56-seconds was James Millward of the RAF, followed by Simon Byrne of Swindon Harriers and Ollie Campbell of Cirencester AC. For the Ladies, Catie O'Donoghue of Bristol & West AC led the way home in a time of one-hour twenty five minutes, followed by Sophie Voller of Westbury Harriers and Martina Cambruzzi from Yatton.

The Hullavington Full Marathon

Following on from the success of the Half Marathon; we are going to undertake a rather ambitious event in the village. The Hullavington Full Marathon will take place on Sunday 26th September and will be the first Marathon held on the roads of Wiltshire in over 30years!!! The race will take place over an undulating 26.2-mile course starting and finishing outside the Hullavington Arms and taking in Grittleton, Yatton Keynell, Kington St Michael, Sherston, Alderton and Littleton Drew.

We already have over one hundred runners signed up coming from afar afield as London, West Midlands and Wales all running to try and earn one of the specially minted spinning finishers medals. There is also the option to run the Marathon distance as part of a four-person relay and there will also be a supporting 10K run. Of course, to host the event we require course marshals and we are keen to involve members of the local community.

If you are available to assist for a few hours to get the runners safely around the course then we would like to hear from you, and in return for your services we will provide a beer/food voucher for £30 to spend at the Hullavington Arms.

What does a SV (Street Volunteer) do?

* Just keep an eye out for anything you think is suspicious, out of the ordinary, anti social behaviour, vandalism, abuse of elderly, suspicious vehicles, hare coursing, loose animals and theft etc in your street.

* In the fist instance inform the Police, please let me know and I will log the information and inform the relevant authority if needed. Your details are kept confidential, unless the information is needed for investigation and or criminal prosecution by the Police or local council, in which case I will gain your written permission first.

The council will be asking for your views on how you think residents, communities and businesses in the county can all play their part to achieve this.

STREET LAMPS IN THE VILLAGE

Climate change is something that will affect all of us over the next few years.

One small change that will be happening in the village, probably in October, is the replacing of all our street lamps with LED units.

The advantages of LED lighting include:

- LEDs are much more efficient and use much less electricity than other lamps or bulbs for similar output, reducing energy costs.
- Have extremely long lives compared to traditional lights.
- Produce very little heat.

- Produce much fewer carbon emissions through energy generation.
- Contain no mercury.
- Can operate effectively in both cold and hot environments.
- Produce a white light to enable the human eye to see natural colours at night.
- Are much more directional than other lights, reducing 'sky glow' and glare.
- LEDs are instantaneous and function at full output when switched on.
- No warm-up times as with most street lighting.
- They can be dimmed at off peak times.
- They provide improved uniformity of light.
- Variation in colour temperatures are available for specific applications.

LUNGWORM—dog owners beware!

Lungworm hotspots in Wiltshire have been revealed after vets warn thousands of dogs are at risk from the deadly parasite.



Cases have been reported in Chippenham,

Melksham and Trowbridge and areas around Swindon. The damp weather in May is expected to cause slug and snail activity to explode, meaning dogs are at greater risk of contracting lungworm in the garden, on walks and even by drinking from water bowls or puddles.

Dogs can be infected with the potentially fatal parasite when they eat common slugs and snails in their garden or on walks. The slime of slugs and snails can contain the infective lungworm parasite that can cause disease in dogs.

A survey from Elanco Animal Health says 42 per cent of dog owners are not aware of what lungworm is or how it can infect dogs.

WILTSHIRE COUNCIL BEGINS WILDFLOWER TRIALS

The warm and wet weather has given Wiltshire Council the perfect conditions to make changes to its grass cutting policy and begin its wildflower trials.

On rural stretches, the council has begun cutting visibility splays on junctions and bends.

The remaining verges will be left, untouched, until September to allow for wildflowers to grow.

A new "cut and collect" scheme is currently being piloted on the A350 to encourage wildflower growth.

A spokesman for the council said: "Collecting the grass means less nutrients go back into the soil, and this creates conditions that encourage the growth of wildflowers." In more urban areas grassy areas are usually cut monthly between March and October. However, in amenity areas such as parks, the local authority is doing an "environmental cut" once in March, July and September.

It is also running wildflower trials in these areas on a "cut and collect" basis.

Cabinet member for highways and street scene, Mark McClelland said: "Our grass cutting approach has been designed to provide a good balance to keep our green spaces safe and tidy, while at the same time giving wildflowers an opportunity to thrive.

EMERGENCY ALERTS

Emergency Alerts is a new service from the UK government. It's expected to launch in summer 2021.

Emergency alerts will warn you if there's a danger to life nearby. In an emergency, your phone or tablet will receive an alert with advice about how to stay safe.

When you get an emergency alert, your phone or tablet may: make a loud siren-like



sound, even if it's set on silent, vibrate, read out the alert. The sound and vibration will last for about 10 seconds.

Stop what you're doing and follow the instructions in the alert.

Sometimes an alert will include a phone number or a link to the GOV.UK website for more information. The government and mobile phone networks are <u>testing emergency alerts</u>. You may get an alert if you live in, or travel through, a test area.

If you're driving or riding when you get an alert. Find somewhere safe to stop before using your phone or tablet. It is illegal to use a hand-held device while driving or riding.

If you want to see an alert again. You can find <u>current</u> <u>alerts</u> and <u>past alerts</u> at gov.uk/alerts. You can also search for them on your phone or tablet. Find alerts on Android phones and tablets Find alerts on iPhone

How it works. Emergency alerts are broadcast from mobile phone masts. Every compatible mobile phone or tablet in range will receive an alert.

The government does not need your phone number to send you an alert.

COVID VACCINE PASSPORT SCAM

We have been made aware of a Covid Vaccine Passport scam email going around that purports to be from the NHS and informs recipients that they can apply for their "Digital Coronavirus Passports"



Clicking on the link within the email, takes you to a convincing but fake NHS website that asks for personal and payment details. (for an admin fee) The website has since been taken down, but in case similar emails/websites appear can you please circulate the attached alert to your residents, members, groups and mailing lists.

And just to reiterate, your vaccination status is obtained FREE through the NHS App, website or by calling the NHS on 119.

Last month, for the first time this year, the group met at the village hall. On Tuesday 8th June the weather was so lovely we took our chairs outside and sat in the sun/shade chatting about our current book, and recent book group choices. So wonderful to be back.

Hopefully, these meetings can now continue. The sessions are held 2.00 to 4.00 in the side room on the second Tuesday in the month.

The May title was 'The Dry' by Jane Harper.

Most members enjoyed this fast-paced novel, and we all the felt the author really captured the intense heat felt in the little Australian town during a prolonged dry spell. Some of us were reminded of a previous Book Group choice, 'The Dressmaker', by Rosalie Ham, also set in a small town in Australia, in this case during the 1950's.

Our June choice was 'The Sealwoman's Gift' by Sally Magnusson.

In 1627, Barbary pirates raided the coast of Iceland and abducted at least 400 of its people, including 250 from a tiny island off the mainland. Among the captives sold into slavery in Algiers were the island pastor, his wife and their three children.





Meet the Villager

A light hearted chat with a local about their time in Hullavington

In this edition we meet Bob Fenner



Sue and I moved into a house in The Parklands in August 1976. I had been appointed to a position based at what was then Chippenham Technical College – teaching English and Psychology.

We had made the choice not to live in a town or city but instead to see what it was like to live in an English "working village" for a few years. We have not been disappointed by what we have enjoyed over decades of living in the wonderful village of Hullavington. Within days I was co-opted by the amazing Aubrey Saunders onto the two major organisations in the village - the Village Hall Committee and the Hullavington Entertainments Association - that, collectively, put on a wide range of social and cultural activities for villagers to join and enjoy throughout the year.

Throughout the 70s, 80s and 90s these hall-based activities included weekly/monthly dances, parties, jumble sales, horse race evenings etc. Then there was the Annual Carnival that ran for a whole week with at least a dozen different activities taking place during that period.

My favourite leisure activity has always been amateur dramatics and I was extremely fortunate to be able to immediately join a well -established local village group - The Hullavington Players. I enjoyed working with this group in different roles (mainly directing and script writing) helping to produce a farce or comedy, and a pantomime, each year. The Players also developed into one of the most well-respected village drama groups in Wiltshire – regularly winning awards from the Annual Malmesbury and District One-Act Play Festival. Sadly, the group folded in the late 1990s. In 1986 I was appointed as Research Fellow to a project based at Bath and Southampton University Schools of Education. The post involved extensive travelling throughout England to attend meetings or deliver workshops at various universities in England. In 1990 I was appointed to the post of Director of Educational Development and Standards at the National Fire Service College in Moreton in Marsh.

Whilst at the college, I acquired an overseas remit that involved attending conferences and running workshops in America and Canada. In 1997, I was seconded to Oklahoma State University to work with a team setting up an International Accreditation System for fire-related courses and programmes. Being away from the village and the family whilst on these trips and periods away (whether in the UK or overseas) was always an emotional wrench however fascinating and enjoyable they were. But coming home, from wherever, to the silent tranquillity of our Hullavington village home was always a welcome recompense.

I retired from full-time work in 2001 and now had much more time to devote to favourite activities, such as writing, painting, gardening, walking, pub lunches etc. I also had the time to work with an amazing group of people who formed the project team that rebuilt new the village hall, that opened in September 2006, after the old one burnt down in 2004. The village hall has always played an important part in our lives as Sue and I have enjoyed so many different activities and events that have taken place there. I joined the village hall committee in 1976 and I have served as chair of that committee since 2006.

Throughout the time we have lived in the village it has always continued to offer a sense of community and security, where valuable friendships can flourish, where enjoyable activities are always on offer, and where tranquillity reigns. Yes, we are so pleased we came to live in Hullavington!

The 'then' picture was taken in 1986 and when looking at the front of the cottages it is probable that not too much had changed since the cottages had been built around 150 years before. Certainly a couple have more modern windows. The lady just about to enter number 27 was Mrs Gough. Sadly she was to pass away in December of 1986. To Jason Miles, whose company produces the Hullavington News, she was Auntie Doro-thy, a sister of his grand mother Mrs Miles who lived just up the road in Greens Close. Following Mrs Gough's death Jason and his family lived for a few years in number 27.

The 'now' picture shows the many changes over the past 35 years. Most cottages now have a porch or front extension and four have knocked down the front walls to provide off the road car parking—sadly, a necessity in these times. Dave Hunt
