



HULLAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL



The Annual Parish Meeting was held on 28th April via Zoom with 32 people "attending"! The last time we had such a turnout was in the nineties when the MOD put forward a proposal to build up to 12,000 houses on the airfield and over 100 parishioners attended.

The Parish Council looks forward to meeting more of you at our meetings when they can once again be held in the Village Hall.

Due to technical difficulties, the report from the Village Hall could not be heard but a written report from Bob Fenner will be available to view on the Parish Council website, as will all the above reports. No reports were received from: Buckley Barracks, Wiltshire Police, Hullavington School and Wiltshire Council.

In Public Question Time a parishioner spoke about the need for the village to adapt regarding Climate Change.

Another parishioner questioned the Broadband speed of the village and his concern regarding the possibility of the Neighbourhood Plan being overturned.

The positioning of the new 30mph sign at the Cemetery end of the village was raised by a parishioner.

The village verges were also mentioned by a parishioner who wanted to know if they could be left in order for wild flowers to thrive - what were the farmers spraying on the fields and he also mentioned a damaged drain in Greens Close.

ROADWORKS

The recent roadworks at Cemetery Corner certainly got the village reacting on Facebook!

As the Parish Council had not received notification of a Temporary Traffic Regulation Order for any roadworks in that area, I queried it with Wiltshire Council and managed to get to the bottom of it - eventually! Well - it has only taken four years but at last there will soon be flashing advisory 20mph speed limit signs in the area of the school! They will only be used at school drop-off and pick-up times and was an aspiration brought forward from the Hullavington Neighbourhood Plan.

Initial discussions with the school were held in March 2017, when the then Leader of Wiltshire Council Cllr Jane Scott, Dave Thomas - Traffic Engineering Manager of Wiltshire Council and myself met with the Headteacher Sue Tudge. It was agreed that there was justification for the sign but the school would have to update the School Travel Plan.

The update took rather longer than originally intended but the scheme itself was agreed as satisfactory by the Parish Council at the meeting held on 14th March 2018.

The Parish Council was then consulted regarding these road works in March 2020 and responded with a counter proposal to Wilts Council as below:

"To extend the 30mph limit onto the C1 Southerly direction from the Street towards the Rail Bridge (Norton direction) and again from the Street in a Northerly direction (towards the A429) to beyond the cemetery and Telephone Exchange in the interest of road traffic and pedestrian safety.

Through DYSON re-development of the Hullavington Airfield, a new Roundabout and Road layout is under construction at the junction of the A429 and the C1. Whilst welcomed, (there have been accidents/ fatality at this junction) it is difficult to exit the C1 to the A429 at peak times in either direction, the improvement will undoubtedly increase traffic along the C1 as it will be much easier to exit the C1 onto the A429 instead of taking alternative but longer routes to avoid the junction. The increase in traffic will impact on the C1 junction at Hullavington increasing the possibility of a road traffic and or pedestrian accident. For a minor cost, the Highways Department could erect two 30mph signs in the locations suggested above and improve road traffic and pedestrian safety at the crossroads C1 and the Street at Hullavington. The cost would be the same as moving the two signs currently located near the school to the junction of the Street/C1 as proposed."

Wiltshire Council then needed more additions and updates made to the School Travel Plan, then COVID-19 got in the way but now the scheme has finally been implemented.

THE SAME OLD STORY

I have received so many comments recently regarding the amount of dog poo throughout the village.

Worst affected areas are The Street, the path between the Village Hall and Greens Close and the footpath that runs alongside the school at the back of Mere Avenue, which has to be used on a regular basis by the children in our village school in order to adhere to Covid rules.



If you don't clear up, you could be served with a fixed penalty notice or prosecuted and fined up to £1,000. As with many things, it is the few that spoil it for the many.

There are thirteen litter/dog bins in the village! Enjoy your walks, please remember to keep your dog under control where there is livestock around and always follow the Countryside Code. A guide is posted on the web by searching for 'Wiltshire council dog owners guide'.

THE NEW WAY TO ORDER REPEAT PRESCRIPTIONS

Malmesbury Primary Care Centre

From Monday 8th June, the quickest way to order prescriptions is to phone our dedicated prescribing service (aka POD) on 0300 123 6242. Phone lines are open 9am -5pm every week day excluding bank holidays. This service will be a safer and more effective way of getting your repeat medications. Once you have called the POD, your prescription will be available at your nominated pharmacy within 4 working days. There is no need to register for this service, simply call when you have 7 days left of your medication. You will also be able to order online

CATALYTIC CONVERTER—STOLEN ON FRIDAY 30TH APRIL

In broad daylight! below is the information I received: " *****' s car had its catalytic converter stolen last Friday afternoon whilst it was parked on The Street apparently by two men in blue overalls using a red car jack. We have sent a report to the police (just waiting for our crime number). Although ****** ****** saw it going on it was thought they were just repairing ***** 's car!

Sadly, no other vehicle was seen which could be associated with this matter. Thieves target catalytic converters because they contain precious metals, like platinum, palladium or rhodium, that are valuable to metal dealers.

Following the recent theft above, the following might be worth a read.

Car crime is a real problem in the UK. Alarmingly, one car is stolen every ten minutes. With Covid-19 and the recent lockdowns, many people aren't



driving or checking on their cars as much as they used to. At Neighbourhood Watch, we need your help to remind car owners to remain vigilant about where and how they park their cars, in order to keep them safe.

John Hayward-Cripps, CEO of Neighbourhood Watch Network, says

"Most car crimes happen because cars are left unlocked. There is a misconception that some cars are auto-locking and lock themselves if left unattended after a period of time. This isn't always correct. Another misconception is that your car is too old and no one will bother stealing it. This is also incorrect – both new and old cars are at risk. Having a car stolen or broken into is more than simply a hassle, it can impact on people's livelihoods. The good news is that there are simple steps everyone can take to help reduce the risk to their car. With only a 46% recovery rate we're reminding everyone to leave your car locked, lit and empty."

THE CHURCH CLOCK

At last we have some news! Thanks to Ken Reed's ingenuity, we now have it working but it does not keep accurate time. The regulator that was fitted over 10 years ago has gone wrong and we

need a replacement. It will cost £2500 and we really need some help to finance this.

We are asking people living in the village if they would be prepared to help us fund-raise for this repair. If you can support us we will be very grateful. There are considerable costs in maintaining our church, a really ancient building. Resources are



always stretched so we hope that those of you who love seeing or hearing the clock may be able to support us. We have some general structural issues on the wall of the Bradfield Chapel that we are having expert guidance on and clearly our limited funds must be reserved for repairs to the fabric of the building.

Many of us will by now have had either one or both of our Covid-19 vaccinations. Those of you who visited the Malmesbury Primary Care Centre on one of the Pfizer mass-vaccination days will have, no doubt, noticed the stewards helping out in the car park. Hopefully you found their efforts helpful. These stewards were coordinated by the local Rotary Club of the South Cotswolds.

On each of these days somewhere around 800 people were vaccinated – at a site in no way suitable for that number of people (and their cars) in one day! Each vaccination day needed a crew of at least 5 outdoor stewards – in all the Rotary Club organised well over 100 steward shifts. This was made more difficult as the Primary Care Centre generally only had a few days' notice of each batch of vaccine and then had to arrange vaccinators and book in recipients in a hurry – and to contact the Rotary Club to ask for car park stewards!

The stewarding resource required was beyond the capabilities of the South Cotswold Rotary Club alone – so the Club was very pleased to have the support of a number of friends and from the nearby Rotary Club of Royal Wootton Bassett and District. In fact one of the friends who became a stalwart steward noted what we were doing when he came for his own vaccination and asked to join us!

Being outdoor stewards we were, of course, subject to the full range of British Spring weather, including rain, wind, hail, lightning, occasional sunshine and the coldest April for many a year! However we received many accolades and thanks from those coming for their vaccinations which reinforced the knowledge we were making a significant contribution to the vaccination effort locally.

HULLAVINGTON BOOK GROUP



The plan is to return to regular meetings at the Village Hall in June if restrictions allow. The sessions will be held in the side room, on the second Tuesday in the month, at 2.00 pm.

Micky the pony and Mike Scott delivered our books in March and April. They rose to the occasion beautifully when filmed by Channel 5 and Points West, also appearing in newspapers too, locally and across the country.

In March we read 'SHADOWPLAY' by Joseph O' Connor.

The book brings together the lives of Abraham 'Bram' Stoker, Sir Henry Irving, and Ellen Terry. Bram Stoker started his working life as a clerk, and went on to become a theatre manager and part time writer. Born in Dublin in 1847, he died in London in 1912, never having known literary success. 'Dracula', Bram Stoker's 1897 Gothic Horror story, made little money during his lifetime, but since the release of a Hollywood film version in 1931, the book has never been out of print.

Sir Henry Irving, born John Henry Brodribb, in 1838, was an actor/manager, one of the most famous of English actors, and the first of his profession to be Knighted. He died in 1905.

Dame Alice 'Ellen' Terry, was born into a theatrical family in 1847. As a child, she started acting in Shakespearean plays in London, and went on to become the highest paid actress in England, much beloved by the public. She died in 1928. It is said her ghost haunts the Lyceum Theatre in London.

Extract from the novel:

"Just before dawn, October 12th 1905. In which two gentlemen of the theatre set out from London for Bradford.

Out of the gathering swirls of mist roars the hot black monster, screeching and belching its bilious smoke......

.....In the dimly lit First Class compartment of the dawn mail coach from King's Cross, two gentlemen of the theatre are seated across from one another, in blankets and shabby mufflers and miserably threadbare mittens and a miasma of early morning sulk.



Meet the Villager

A light hearted chat with a local about their time in Hullavington

In this edition we meet Ali Reed



Every summer in the late 1950s early 60s

saw the Brown family leave their home in Stanley Co Durham to drive to Chippenham for a 2 week holiday with family. There were no motorways, few services and the journey took upwards of 10 or 11 hours.

Little Alison sitting in the back seat watched for the hangars covered in grass, and as they passed them she knew they were nearly there.

Roll forward to 1983, house hunting after a 3 year spell in Abu Dhabi and Kuwait, Ken and Ali Reed passed those same grassed hangars and found their forever home in Hullavington. We were passing through but stopped at the little village shop because the house next door had a For Sale sign outside. Peter Berry in the shop told us the owners were away but he was sure an Aunt of the owners would show us round. Miss Edgington duly came and sold us Edenhurst House, she should have been an estate agent!!

We moved in on December 5th 1983 and were made to feel welcome here by everyone we met. School for daughter Jenny was just next door, there was a playgroup in the village hall for little Philip when he was old enough, a shop, a post office, a garage with petrol pumps, 2 churches and 2 pubs --- perfect!

Ken had a new job with the Water Research Centre in Swindon, at times travelling all over the country, often spending a few nights away, but being here in the village without him felt very safe and secure. Before long I became joint leader of the village playgroup, was involved with activities at church and as a parent volunteer at the village school. In 1988 a maternity vacancy became available at school and I was fortunate to be appointed – fortunate because I trained and worked as a Home Economics teacher before Jenny was born. However I was retrained on the job by Mrs Sneyd, and managed to stay employed at school until December 2002.

Early retirement it was not!!! 5 years earlier we had bought the empty village shop attached to our house. As architecture students our daughter Jenny and her fiancée Mike drew up plans to convert the shop into a 3 bedroom house—this became a live project and was built in 2002/3. On completion it became our B&B – Serendipity! -- and I had a new career which lasted until mid 2016.

It was hard work, lots of fun and we met lots of interesting people, some of whom are still friends. It was a very special privilege to be able to look after friends and family of people who lived in the village. We also hosted a weekly coffee morning which was popular for over 10 years and raised a lot of money for locally connected charities.

Since retiring I wonder when there was time to work. We now have 4 grandchildren, two in Bristol who are frequent visitors and two in Whitley Bay in Tyne and Wear, so before 2020 we travelled north once a month to do some childcare and refresh the accent!! I'm a volunteer cook at Doorway in Chippenham, and still very much involved in the life of our Parish church.

Frequent visits to the West Coast of Scotland are about to be resumed, but east or west home is best, and home for us is here in Hullavington.

HULLAVINGTON HISTORY—THEN AND NOW



The Star Inn/Hullavington Arms—In the early 1970's, a group of steam and transport enthusiasts formed the North Wilts & South Gloucs Preservation Society. The chairman was a Mr J Stevens who lived in the village. In 1972, they organised a large steam and transport 'Olde Tyme Fantasia' in fields just to the south of the village. In 1973, they organised a small event around the Star Inn. Two steam traction engines and a road roller were parked in front of the pub and stalls and smaller exhibits in the car park. At that time, the pub was famous for its Pile of Pennies. The pile was built up through the year and then 'knocked over' just before Christmas and the money passed to local charities. Apparently, a penny could only be

added to the pile after having been dipped in a beer. It helped to secure the pile!

In recent years, the Star was renamed the Hullavington Arms and still continues the transport theme with its fascinating RAF displays throughout



the rooms, and of course still offers a very warm welcome. Dave Hunt
