

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#### **BBQ** Chicken

This is a family favourite courtesy of my very first cook book from M&S! If you're not a fan of tomato soup don't be put off by the Heinz soup as you wouldn't know it's in the casserole and the end result is delicious. Making the day before or freezing it improves the flavour. Try serving with creamy mash or pasta if preferred.

#### **Ingredients**

1kg/2lb Chicken Portions 1tbs Plain Flour Salt/Pepper 2 tbs Cooking Oil 25g/1oz Butter

#### Sauce

1 small Onion finely chopped 27g/10oz Heinz Cream of Tomato Soup 2 tbs Soft Brown Sugar 1 tbs Worcestershire Sauce 1 tbs Wine Vinegar

2 tsps Prepared English Mustard

#### <u>Method</u>

Coat chicken lightly in seasoned flour.

Heat oil and butter in large frying pan. Fry chicken fairly briskly until golden brown. Transfer chicken to a casserole.

Fry onion in same oil for a minute and add all other ingredients. Simmer for 10mins. Pour over chicken in casserole and cover.

Cook in preheated oven at 180C/350F/Gas 4 for 1 hour.



estaupant Review La Flambé - Sutton Benger

# ${f L}$ ooking for somewhere a little bit special and a change from a pub then look no further than La Flambe in Sutton Benger.

We went on a Wednesday evening and while it was not too busy I would still recommend booking to avoid disappointment. The staff were very welcoming and attentive. The wonderful variety of starters and mains will appeal to all tastes. The food arrived promptly and was beautifully cooked and presented with delicious sauces and a great variety of vegetables. Portions are very generous so unless you only want a main course I would suggest eating very little during the rest of the day! Unfortunately we could not make it to the desserts.

We went for the A La Carte menu but to be honest the cost was not that much more than a lot of pub meals and the set menu for 2 or 3 courses is really good value for money. This is a lovely restaurant that is well worth a visit.

# **Councillor's Questions**

#### with Nick Botterill

#### Autumn at Wiltshire Council

J ust as wildlife uses Autumn to prepare for winter, so does the local council! One of the areas of major activity is on the financial budgets for the coming year.

A big part in the health of any large organization is down to overall financial control, and Wiltshire Council is certainly no exception. I am pleased to say that despite inflation remaining high for much longer than anticipated and

despite rising demand for many services, the finances are very much under control at Wiltshire Council unlike many other councils up and down the country which have multi million pound deficits, sometimes tens of millions, with few options for balancing the books. That Wiltshire is in a different place is I believe down to prudent oversight and good practices. It is the very reason that the council is able to consider increasing the annual sum spent on road maintenance by £10m – something I only intimated in the last edition of Hullavington News. We now have to make sure that every penny of this extra money is spent wisely and efficiently.

Earlier in the summer, the draft Local Plan 2020 - 2038 was agreed by Wiltshire Council. This is the document which sets out the scale and nature of future new development across the county and hence it is very important. The big headline is that while additional development of new houses will continue – this has to be done to meet legal obligations - it will be on a smaller scale (roughly a third less) than over the past decade and it will be concentrated in and around the major towns and on 'brown field' land as much as possible. There are moves to introduce greener construction as well as a greater proportion of 'affordable' homes. Public consultation on the Local Plan will start later this month and there will be a series of open dropin sessions around the county where the Plan will be explained and questions can be asked of council officers – see www.wiltshire.gov.uk/article/8048/Currentconsultation-Reg-19-autumn-2023 for more details.

I trust that you all had a good summer and I reiterate as always, please do feel free to get in touch with me (see contact details below) about anything to do with Hullavington or the wider By Brook or Wiltshire County areas. This is generally a fantastic area to live in but sometimes you just need to speak to the local councillor to get something done.

A Message from the Chair - Hullavington Parish Council

I will keep this short as the Parish Council Newsletter will be out soon.  $\Delta$  s winter approaches, it is time for that final trim of garden hedges and

A swinter approaches, it is time for that final trim of garden hedges and shrubs. Please keep in mind that where they excessively overhang footpaths, people are forced to walk on the road if they should happen to meet other footpath users.

There are road signs within the village where hedging and shrubs are partially obscuring them, please check, and trim them back.

For information, if anyone is thinking of putting something on Highways land, road, footpaths, and grass verges within the village, don't just do it, ask Highways for permission, they very often request that a license is applied for, if not, they may remove whatever it may be without notice.

The Speed Indicator Device was returned to the supplier after several reset attempts – it worked for a while and then didn't. It will be re installed as soon as the volunteers have the time to do that. I am expecting to have to do a bit of trial -and-error aligning to hit the sweet spot for catching the budding racing drivers.

Request for a Road Sweeper visit is in, should anyone see it on the day, please, if you can, move your car from the side of the road so that a full sweep will be completed.



### Hullavington XX Eton Close or the journey to fibre

T he project name which has caused so much confusion in the last week or so shows very clearly the origin of our Fibre Optic Upgrade story. It is a story where our perseverance and fortitude in the face of huge corporate bodies has shown that the little guy can absolutely win.

The project was originally conceived in March of 2021 as a small (in size) upgrade by two neighbours Toni Ann and myself - well to be truthful it was her idea! We had our first meeting in the Church and gathered about 50 people who wanted to participate and then submitted our interest specifically with Openreach, because once the upgrade was complete we would have access to the widest range of broadband products possible. We had thought all would be sorted by the following summer.

The first quotes came back and the geographical spread of interest throughout the village had increased the project cost requiring more people and so we set off on the journey to gather enough interest sufficient to pay for the project, the one thing we were always clear on was that it should be free to everyone. By October we were ready to go with over 260 participants.

#### Not long now, we thought!

Unbelievably the survey took 6 months to complete and by the time it was ready it was double the initial estimate. But with work it would still be just about do-able.

In July 2021 we had our first big set back, the LOT 30 government procurement went live, and legally all work on Community Fibre Partnerships (CFP) had to come to a complete standstill-gutted doesn't fully explain how we felt. However, we were sure that the CFP was our best route out of the technological backwater we were in and that it was worth fighting for. And we were also extremely concerned - given we had already been passed over in the first procurement - that it was quite likely to happen again. We asked for help (although honestly we were unsure what could be achieved) from our councils both local and county and were very grateful to both Nick Botterill (County Councillor) and through his intervention the team at Wiltshire Council in charge of delivering fibre to the county, and our MP James Gray who were of huge help.

Whilst we couldn't at that time restart the process, it was vital that this avenue wasn't closed off to us. And so we spent several months fighting to ensure we achieved the best outcome finally we receiving a written guarantee that "should we receive no bid in LOT 30 that they (Openreach) would restart, and requote the CFP process" this was vital because at that time no new CFP's were being accepted.

In January two things happened, the Gigabit Voucher amount increased from £1500 to £4500, and we notified the BDUK of the OpenReach guarantee. Several days later we were surprised when BDUK decided that they wanted us to continue with the community fibre upgrade "**WooHoo**" we thought, but life is never quite that easy.

LOT 30 procurement had (as we had both feared and predicted) excluded us, and all parties agreed the way forward and our application for funding via the government Gigabit Voucher Scheme was submitted at the end of March. We were told it could take a while, but everyone was on board, everyone was happy. Well obviously not everyone because at the end of July the Vouchers Team at BDUK refused our funding —DISASTER! Everyone involved - County, OpenReach and BDUK central command, myself and ToniAnn were disbelieving and furious in equal measure. But again, we refused to give up, we rallied and started to lobby BDUK, liaised closely with Wiltshire Council and Openreach, whilst continuing to talk to BDUK. We waited and kept the faith. Finally on 25<sup>th</sup> July BDUK once more asked Openreach to resubmit our application for funding approval, and by the end of August we finally had our funding.

In September we set a record by reaching our voucher target in 4 days. And as this article is published we will have completed validation and I'm going to predict we'll have done it again in a record time.

It's been an interesting journey, full of highs and lows.

But knowing that our community will not be one of the rural areas left mouldering without proper access to the wider world is amazing. And the thought of being able to watch a film without buffering is simply a joy.

Project Details this will directly upgrade 290 properties at a zero cost to the residents. But it will also facilitate the remaining properties to upgrade at a later date, at their own cost.



#### July: The Dictionary of Lost Words by Pip Williams

This book was enjoyed by most, although some found it a bit slow. The group had an excellent afternoon discussing the use of language throughout the British Isles and the world.

"The Dictionary of Lost Words" is a fascinating story of language, love and loss, based on historical fact. Pip Williams pays tribute to the little known world of lexicography and the endless patience of the team as they work on creating the very first Oxford English Dictionary. The heart of the story is very thought provoking as it celebrated the value of discarded words and the power of language in shaping today's world.

The novel is rather slow paced but somehow reflects the very nature of the work these memorable characters are so devoted to. I would certainly recommend this to anyone who has a love of the English language.'

In a cottage hidden amongst the misty Welsh hills of Offa's Dyke, Bea Dallaway is called to help Simon Armstrong, who is searching for peace to write a book. Instead, he finds himself disturbed by unsettling noises and visions.

Not one of the most gripping books we have read, but it gave us a lot to talk about.

Review:

'While not normally a fan of novels that explore the supernatural I must admit to becoming engrossed in Erskine's novel of forbidden love that cleverly blends history with fiction.

Set in the two parallel time zones of Anglo Saxon England and modern day Hereford, the novel seamlessly slips between the two. It is well written with numerous unexpected twists and turns.

I particularly enjoyed the historical storyline of doomed love, so much so that at times I found the modern day story rather intrusive. I am definitely going to explore more about the history of the Princes of Powys and Offa's Dyke If you are a history aficionado, like time slip fiction and enjoy a touch of the other-

worldly this is a definite must for you.'

#### The North Wiltshire Mobile Library Service...

## THIS EDITION : The lost beer house of Hullavington

Many villagers remember there being two public houses in Hullavington but how many realise that at one time there were three pubs in the village. The Star, which opened as a public house in 1819 and was rebuilt in about 1900; the Queens Head which was possibly an 18<sup>th</sup> century building and then refronted in 1903. Plus a third "Beer House" in the grounds of the church.

A church house had been built in the churchyard facing the Street in the early 1500's. During the 19<sup>th</sup> century it became an inn called The Plough possibly under the Beerhouse Act of 1830. I show a painting of it by C.G.C. Awdrey July 1877.

A householder paid an annual licence costing two guineas to sell beer often brewed in the back room. Their front parlour was the "Beer House" or sometimes called an "Ale House".

The 1871 census lists The Plough Inn with Eleanor Tanner, widow, aged 73 "Retail Beer Seller". The censuses of 1841.1851 and 1861 show John Tanner as a Beer Seller and Victualler together with his wife Eleanor. John Tanner senior, who died in February 1871. appeared to have run The Plough with Eleanor for well over 30 years.



Eleanor was born in January 1797, her nee name being Greenman. Her father was Thomas Greenman and mother Mary Sargent. Eleanor married John Tanner 19 May 1828 and they had four children John, Joseph, Eleanor and Kezia Tanner Cowley. Eleanor died in 1885 aged 88.

The Plough closed around 1877 and was demolished in the late 1800's. It was known locally as the "Devil's Clip" because of the character of the people who went there.

#### Charitable giving update - Spear Bristol

In July three members of the PCC attended a Spear Celebration Evening in the crypt of Christchurch Clifton. Spear aims to help young people who, for whatever reason, are struggling to get into work or back into education.

Over a period of six weeks the training staff encourage, enable and empower a group of ten to twelve young adults, giving them strategies and tools to create CVs, fill out application forms, apply for work or courses and attend interviews with confidence. Ten of the eleven people who had just completed the latest course, told their own stories to an audience of about 50 adults.

Coming to Spear from different backgrounds and by various routes, their testimonies were well prepared, well delivered and interesting; some were funny, some were emotional, all were impressive and very well received.

## PARISH CHURCH OF ST MARY MAGDALENE

After the young people had spoken, they were invited one at a time to go forward so that one of the training staff could publicly affirm each individual and celebrate the special qualities they had shown during the course. Each was given a certificate and a personal gift as a reminder – a thoughtful and personal keepsake. The staff really get to know the students and this continues as they support each young person at a weekly session for a year after the 6 week course.

The young people who made presentations were the eleventh cohort to be mentored by Spear; to date they have just over an 80% success rate of young people still in work after a year. The PCC team came away in awe of the project; the enthusiasm and dedication they encountered were impressive and confirmed the feeling that *Spear* is a great choice for the PCC's 3 year tythe.



This month's selection from Walks Around Hullavington explores

#### Walking near the Railway Bridge - Distance: 0.75 miles

In each issue of Hullavington News over the last eighteen months, it's been my pleasure to update and republish a selected walk from the lovely set of "Walks Around Hullavington", originally compiled by John Greenwood and Alan Roberts in 1995. These ten walks provide an excellent introduction to our local footpaths and are also published on the Parish Council website.

#### This month, I'd like to update readers about a pedestrian safety issue that Mandy House and I are looking at as a joint Footpath Group and Neighbourhood Watch campaign.

The map to the right, based on Wiltshire Council's definitive rights of way map, highlights a three-quarter mile section of road, running under the railway bridge north of the village. This road provides the shortest, and in most cases, the only route for pedestrians between at least ten well used footpaths, tracks and entrances. Walks 3, 4, 8 and 9 of *Walks Around Hullavington* also entail crossing or walking along this section of road.

The problem seems to be that people are finding walking on the road here unnecessarily scary and dangerous. Some have reported near misses with passing vehicles, while others are put off walking here because they feel it's unsafe.


Mandy and I believe something needs to be done to improve pedestrian safety here, so we have contacted our Wiltshire Councillor, Nick Botterill, to explore what improvement options might be possible.

If safety can be improved, not only will four *Walks Around Hullavington* feel the benefit but, we believe, more people generally will be encouraged to walk and cycle locally – for example to the Flying Monk Café and Tap.

Well done to all those who participated in the Wildlife Adventure. It was incredibly exciting to see all the Observations coming in over the previous weeks. This was a novel approach to getting a better perspective on the biodiversity of our parish and one which enables many people to join in.

From the very young, to our elders in the village, people were able to use technology to capture photos of plants, insects, butterflies and bugs of all sorts, plus birdsong. The end result is that we now have nearly 1,000 observations on the database plus an excellent baseline of birds. Many thanks to James Salkeld for his special help on this.

The Wildlife Champions were able to excel with the numbers of species they recorded, plus the rarity and the beauty of the wildlife around us.

There is of course a serious side to all this effort. We now are in a better position to understand where the most biodiverse areas in the parish are, where the greatest care is needed and the efforts we need to make to nurture even better environments. We have received special praise from Nick Self, Wiltshire Wildlife. "This survey is incredibly helpful to our understanding of biodiversity in the area. This quantity of data is something we at the Trust cannot manage outside the reserves and is very valuable".

An especially heart-warming aspect of the exercise was the inclusion of people who, for various reasons, were restricted in their ability to get out and about and yet were able to contribute in such a positive way by making observations in their own gardens. This is a very poignant reminder that our gardens make a substantial difference to biodiversity when managed sensitively. A special mention goes to Emma Trickett for her substantial and significant observations and to Edith Stewart, overall winner in the under 10s.

#### So congratulations to all our winners – listed above. Their contributions have been magnificent!

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

### Village Autumn Show 2005- By Dave Hunt

*W* e have recently enjoyed the annual Village Autumn Show in the Village Hall its normal location. Back in 2005 however in was held in the large barn at Mays Farm, in the centre of the village, with the permission of the owner Victor Rawlins.

The reason it was in the barn that year was because the previous year a large part of the village hall had burnt down. By the summer of 2006 the new and present hall



had been completed and so the show retuned to its normal home.

A few photos to bring back memories of the show in the barn but more particularly the people involved.

The first picture shows the barn itself and indicates that there was plenty of room to lay out the tables. To the right in the blue is Rita Croft and in the centre, also in blue, is Carolyne Samuels. The fact that they both have folders in their hands would indicate that they were judges on the day. It appears that Caroline

is getting final instructions from show organiser Jebbie Hewitt.

The second photo is of Brenda Saunders who was in charge of the Draw. Brenda was the Village Hall cleaner for many years and was a member of the Hall Management Committee. Her husband Aubrey was chairman for almost twenty years.

The Village Show is never without its refreshments and as was normal they were being provided by



the ladies of the WI. On duty that day were Joan Shaw, Sarah Harm-



er and Evelyn Lewis. It looks as if they had chosen the right spot to get electricity for the tea urn.

Traditionally the village 200 Club have a special bumper draw on Village Autumn Show day. That year it was in the hands of Peter Morris and Doug Butler.

Peter on the left was the current promoter of the 200 Club while Doug was a collector and had been for nearly 20 years.



In the early days of the 200 Club many members preferred to have their £1 collected from their front door each month. For many years Doug and his wife Betty



handled the bookings of the Village hall and looked after the keys. I have a feeling that he might have also been the caller in the days when there was a weekly

Bingo night in the hall. His drum that held the Bingo numbers actually survived the hall fire.

Picture five shows Victor Rawlins receiving a winner's cup. The cup that he himself had actually presented to the Show organisers, and was for the runner up with

most points in the vegetable and flower sections. Victor was a great supporter of the Village Hall and served on the committee for many years and often aided it financially.

For many years he represented the Short Mat Bowls group, for which he had great enthusiasm. When the new hall was being planned he was always quick to stress the needs of the short mat bowls. In the front of the picture but with her back to the camera is Jebbie Hewitt and looking on by the door is her husband Dudley. They or-



ganised the Show for sixteen years from 2003 to 2018.

The final picture shows Dudley auctioning off the show produce at the end of the afternoon. Something that has been dropped in recent years but from the earliest days of the show it was a tradition to auction off the produce. It looks like his helpers were young Jonny Greenman and Jeff Simpkins.
