THE VILLAGE BUS SHELTER

The bus shelter at the junction of The Street and Watts Lane was erected in 1952 by the Parish Council of the day to commemorate the Coronation of HM Queen Elizabeth II.



In late 2019 the Parish Council decided that it was showing its age and it was time for a new coat of anti-graffiti paint. In addition a couple of the roof tiles had slipped. Councillor Hank Slater volunteered to fix the roof tiles and paint the interior but, on closer inspection, it was discovered that rather more than that was required. The Parish Council agreed that Hank should do whatever was necessary which turned out to be the removal of all the roof tiles, a total replacement of all the battens and roofing felt followed by the replacement of the roof and ridge tiles. The wooden fascia boards were also replaced with PVC which will cut down on future maintenance costs. Some of you may remember seeing Hank - during the hottest week in July



2020 - with his scaffolding around the bus shelter carrying out this task.

Fast forward to this week and the interior of the bus shelter - not an easy task as anti-graffiti paint needs far more preparatory work than ordinary gloss paint. There was also the problem of all the books and bookcases that now re-

side in the bus shelter. Step forward Liz Parry-Williams, her husband Peter and Evelyn Lewis, who made light work of the removal of these items and the replacement of them when the paintwork had been completed.

Additionally, Liz has removed all the cobwebs from the commemoration board and the PVC fascias, washed down the Watts Lane street sign at the side of the shelter and also washed down the Parish Council notice board affixed to the side. Peter then gave the commemorative board a good coating of Linseed oil for added weather protection. A lady in Stanton who was moving home, donated a wicker chair which has now taken its place in the newly repaired and decorated bus shelter.

The new colour of the interior of the bus shelter was chosen by Liz (who is the main voluntary "caretaker" of the building) assisted by her husband Peter and Evelyn Lewis. The ladies also keep an eye on the garden area at the rear of the bus shelter and are often seen titivating the edges and ensuring that they are tidy.

The finishing touch was the placement of that lovely red geranium which first appeared last year, courtesy of Liz. The bus shelter has never looked so smart!

So, it is a huge thank you to all the above mentioned for their contribution to the bus shelter makeover, and also Gemma Hole who willingly let Hank connect up to her electricity supply when it was needed for his generator. A real community effort. Hank never charges for the "labours of love" that he performs for the village - in fact he has still not submitted his bill for the materials he used last year when he sorted out the roof. I shall have to nag him - again!!!



On behalf of all of us, thanks to all involved, it looks great! Ed

INFORMATION FROM THE SURGERY IN MALMESBURY

Patients have been telling us that they are struggling to get through to us, which we are very sorry to hear. We are conducting a complete review of our processes and access options for patients across all staff teams.

We continue to experience unprecedented demand for appointments which has increased by 73% since May 2020 and is now at a higher level for us here in Malmesbury than pre pandemic. We are recalling patients with chronic conditions for routine reviews as many of these were not completed in 2020. We are also managing an increase in non-clinical requests, many of which are beyond our control. Recent examples being enquiries about signing up for the NHS App to access COVID Vaccine certificates, and hundreds of calls regarding the timing and availability of COVID, and now flu, vaccines.

We have employed additional staff, including pharmacists and physiotherapists, installed new phone lines, increased appointment numbers, and introduced a separate service for ordering medication to release our staff. In June, our GP partners increased the length of their clinics to try to make more appointments available and improve access for patients and we successfully recruited additional admin staff as well as another GP who will join us in September as we prepare to roll out Phase 3 of the vaccine programme and flu jabs. Please be assured that we are doing everything we can to offer the best possible service at this time of increased demand.

PLANNING TO TRAVEL ABROAD SOON?

If, when you applied for your new passport you had extra months added to it because, for some reason, you were applying for its renewal early, then the following will be of interest to you.



Red passport holders are being urged to check if their travel document is still valid before travelling abroad after a major rule change.

When UK left the EU last year, a new blue passport design with the lettering 'BRITISH PASSPORT' replaced the original red which is slowly being phased out. However, those who are still using red passports are

being warned to pay careful attention to a rule change surrounding expiry dates which could catch them out.

Passports are now only valid for 10 years exactly - additional months on anyone's red passports (passports issued before the UK left the EU) are no longer valid. This could reduce the validity time by several months without people being aware.

Example: passport issue date 21st Jun 2012, passport expiry date 21st Dec 2022. Your passport expiry date is now the 21st Jun 2022. Most countries in the EU require that your passport is valid for six months on the date of return from your holiday, some countries it's three months, meaning the last date you could return on the above example would be the 21st Dec 2021.

Since 2020, those renewing or applying for a new passport have been issued the new blue design.

Your old EHIC card which was used to avail yourself of medical treatment or services in Europe, is valid until the expiry date shown and will need to be replaced by the new UK GHIC card.

AN UPDATE ON PROJECT OYAM

In February of this year I circulated information regarding Project OYAM, a fundraising initiative to help a village school in Eastern Nepal.

It is being spearheaded by Major Khatri Chakrabahdur who attended this school as a child and who, until recently, was Officer Commanding 90 Sqn RLC at Buckley Barracks. The land has been purchased and surveyed and the design and costings approved with input from the GIFT trustees.

The OMH will be a 3-storey earthquake resistant structure with a full build and fully furnished cost of £184,000.

"Depending on the COVID situation in Nepal, we are planning to lay the foundations in April next year and have the whole project completed by April 2023. With your continued support we believe



this is more than achievable.

We can't thank you enough for your generous support and we look forward to providing you with further updates. as we progress. Chakra".

HULLAVINGTON BOOK GROUP



We meet the second Tuesday in the month, 2-3 pm in the side room at the village hall. During the summer months, we have onioved sitting outside in the sumshine at the half of

we have enjoyed sitting outside in the sunshine at the hall for our meetings.

Our June choice was 'The Sealwoman's Gift' by Sally Magnusson.

As you will see from the reviews, her first novel was a big hit with us. A remarkable story written around a horrendous, but little known event, at least outside Iceland, the themes of slavery still resound today. Also, I thought it juxtaposed the beliefs of two major world religions, Christianity and Islam, and it showed the similarities as much as the differences and how both leave many fundamental questions unanswered. Showed how myth and legends are also important in human existence.

'It conveys a lot of historical information, not in didactic mode but developed via the story and the characters'.

'The way the author moved between, and linked, places and times was very skilfully done.'

'A wonderful novel that brought Icelandic legends and history to life. Based on a factual event, Sally Magnusson's descriptive skills beautifully capture the atmospheric splendour of both Iceland and exotic Tangiers. It is alert to both ethical and cultural differences and is very pertinent to the current slave questions and just how many societies have been impacted by this heinous activity. Despite its dark topic this is a very moving, believable and enjoyable read.'

'I enjoyed it - an interesting portrayal of the slave raids by the Ottoman Empire and surprised they took place as far north.'

In July we read 'The Spy and the Traitor' by Ben Macintyre.

'Bit plodding at times, especially early on in the book but the climax of the escape was I thought very well written, even if one knew the ending.

"Wonder how much had to be left out or has not yet been disclosed. Especially the events after OG's recall to Moscow. I had not read before that the KGB actually had a sort of morality and frowned against such things as adultery. You could assassinate your neighbour but you must not covet his wife. " 'At times espionage does seem like a game played out by English public school boys. What is revealed later varies between what, in hindsight, seems silly and the result of paranoia and the other extreme of people being killed'.

'Most impressive characters seemed to be the two wives, especially Caroline, the wife of the MI6 Station Chief. Reminiscent of the stuff of empire. Be practical, get on with it, stiff upper lip etc'.

'I thought it showed what a good writer John Le Carré was. How he could take all this type of stuff as background and make it so dramatic and readable'.

'Also, you might not agree with her politics but Mrs Thatcher seems to come out of it quite well in her brief appearance. Very decisive in comparison to the image of our current incumbent'.

'Although in a completely different context, the sacrifice or abandonment of one's family followed on a bit from that in the Sealwoman.'

'It was interesting but just not my kind of book. Some of it seems almost too far fetched, but it obviously must have happened - the Harrods' carrier bag, for instance, must have drawn attention to something that was supposed to be secret.'

Our August book choice: 'Miss Benson's Beetle' by Rachel Joyce.

1950—in a devastating moment of clarity, Margery Benson abandons her dead-end job and advertises for an assistant to accompany her on an expedition. She is going to travel to the other side of the world to search for a beetle that may or may not exist.

If you source 'Miss Benson's Beetle' in paperback, 'The Photograph that Inspired a Novel', found at the back of the book, tells how a trip to Kelmscott Manor in Oxfordshire opened the door for Rachel, (suffering from 'writer's block'), and set her on the pathway to completing the novel.

Most people enjoyed 'Miss Benson's Beetle', although one member didn't feel empathy for the characters.

'The Sunday Express write up on the back cover states: "This glorious novel is as much about second chances, heartfelt friendships and emotional courage as it is about trekking through dangerous terrain" Rachel Joyce has once again created the most colourful and believable characters and put them in quite bizarre situations. Her writing, however, is such that she creates a heart warming and entrancing book'.

September title: 'The Salt Path' by Raynor Winn.

A true story. 'Just days before Raynor Winn learned that Moth, her husband of thirty-two years, was terminally ill, they lost their home and livelihood. With nothing left and little time, they impulsively decided to walk the 630-mile South West Coast Path, from Somerset to Dorset, via Devon and Cornwall. Living wild and free at the mercy of sea and sky, they discovered a new, liberating existence, but what would they find and the journey's end?'

WILDLIFE MATTERS — The Hedgehog

We are incredibly lucky to live in the countryside with lots of wonderful wildlife, but populations around the world have shrunk by a massive **68%** on average in the past nearly 50 years. The sad truth is that we are in the middle of a global ecological crisis. So instead of saying "we've got plenty of wildlife here so it's not our prob-

lem!", please think "what can we do to help?". Hedgehogs are on the endangered list in the UK, some rescue centres are very concerned about their long-term survival. I have taken quite a few poorly Hedgehogs to wildlife hospitals over the past few years, most recover well and are released back into Hullavington, though some, due to injuries, sadly haven't made it. Hedgehogs are the cutest little guys and I would love to hear about how



you help the hedgehogs in your garden or if you see any scurrying about through the village (please email emmatrick-

ett@hotmail.com, I'm trying to compile a list of sightings). If you don't have any hedgehog visitors yet, or are wondering how to help, here are a few things you can do:

Wild areas: By encouraging wild areas in your garden, you are helping to create a balanced ecosystem, shelter, and a natural source of food for hedgehogs. Let the grass grow, leave the leaves, and enjoy the natural look! If you are worried about what the neighbours might think, proudly display a blue heart to show that you are caring for wildlife by rewilding your garden (see www.bluecampaignshop.co.uk for more info).

Access to your garden: Create a 'Hedgehog Highway' by cutting a small hole in the bottom of your garden gate or fence to allow access. If you have a dog with a high prey drive it's probably best not to (I'm not sure who would come off worse!).

Grass strimming, bonfires, and fireworks: Please check any long grass and bonfire material before strimming or setting fire to a bonfire. Loud fireworks stun and kill our wildlife through shock and litter - please be compassionate and leave the noisy fireworks! **Nesting:** If you have a nest in your garden, please leave well alone! Disturbing it can cause unnecessary stress and the mum to abandon her young.

Ponds: Ponds are a wonderful addition, please provide a ramp or stoney area for wildlife to use to escape if they fall in.

Garden chemicals and slug pellets: These can kill, please don't use them and keep your garden as natural as possible.

Water: Please provide fresh water in a heavy, shallow dish. Clean the dish regularly to prevent a build-up of algae and germs. **Feeding:** If you are feeding one, please avoid the following: mealworms (no matter how much they love them!), sunflower hearts, fish flavoured cat food, bread, milk, eggs and sweet treats. These foods cause digestion problems, metabolic bone disease, and tooth decay. Only feed fresh water and hedgehog biscuits or meaty cat/dog food.

Hedgehog health: Hedgehogs seen during the daytime are usually poorly and need help. They must be taken to a vet or wildlife hospital asap. The exception is pregnant mums who are busy nestbuilding – they will be very busy carrying nesting material to and fro. If you see a hedgehog covered in ticks, with spine loss, or moving slowly, then there is usually an underlying health issue, so it is best to gently capture (wear gloves!) and take to a wildlife hospital asap for medication, rehabilitation, and then eventual release.

Hibernation: Hedgehogs need to be above a certain weight to survive hibernation. If you see a small or orphaned hedgehog as we go into Autumn, then please contact a wildlife hospital immediately for advice as they will need to be professionally looked after over winter and then released in Spring/Summer.

Dogs: Please keep your dogs on leads when out for your nighttime walk; some dogs are very inquisitive, and both the hedgehog and dog can get nasty injuries from a curious snout or paw! **Children:** Please help to instil a respect for all wildlife in your children, explaining that wildlife is best admired from a distance. Children (and adults!) can become a 'Hedgehog Champion' by registering with www.hedgehogstreet.org to log sightings and by learning about them through their website.

Emergency wildlife contacts:

Vets. If you find a bleeding or badly injured animal, time is of the essence. Most vets will treat wildlife for free and then pass the animal onto a wildlife hospital for rehabilitation once treatment has been administered.

The two new bookings secretaries are working hard to change the booking system platform and moving to hourly bookings, which should free up the hall for more users during the week. The day in the life of an airfield Hangar

With Dyson taking over the airfield, Roché were delighted to be awarded the roller shutter and steel door package by Kier Construction for the refurbishment of Hangar 86 at Hullavington Airfield.



This involved installing multiple roller shutters with one being installed on the left-hand side of the hangar to help protect a new CNC workshop that was under construction. Due to the type of work being carried out within the workshop the roller shutter needed to have high levels of thermal and weather resistance which

made the type of material even more important. To achieve this we used our T77 insulated aluminium roller shutter which was installed with threshold strips for added weather protection, and special brush strips which were within the individual guide channels to help meet the requirements of an air test carried out after the installation.

A separate fire rated roller shutter was installed to cover the canteen area and included an interface panel for linking into the hangar's fire alarm system. This shutter was certified for fire resistance up to 1 hour to demonstrate that it had been tested to the latest fire standards.

Steel combat doors were also installed to cover fire exits across the hangar and were manufactured to suit the exact sizes required.







HULLAVINGTON HISTORY—THEN AND NOW



This month's picture, taken in 1986, shows the large 'Hullavington' sign that used to welcome visitors to the village. Behind it is the school warning sign and further on the 30mph restriction. I'm not sure when the large 'Hullavington' was removed but believe it was in the 1990s. At the same time the 30mph was replaced with a rectangular board which incorporated the 30 but had 'Hullavington' underneath and requested motorists to 'Please drive carefully', with a similar board the other side of the road.

The present photograph shows that all signage has now been removed from the location. It is interesting to note how the trees have grown in the school grounds and a house has been built just beyond the school. 30mph signs are now either side of Cemetery Corner, with one of them displaying 'Hullavington' and 'Please drive carefully'. The new school warning sign is at the entrance to the cemetery. Dave Hunt
